## 7. Description

The main stairs in the central entrance hallway are open stringed with moulded nosings. The balusters are finely turned, two per tread, and terminate in a turned newel. The stairs are straight and reversed in plan.

In 1933, Senator and Mrs. Fletcher McElhannon made some additions to Magnolia Manor. A garage with a bedroom over was added to the rear (west) and a porch was enclosed and a new one extended on the west portion of the front (east) ell.

The present owner, Senator Olen Hendrix, plans to remove the 1933 additions, and restore the house to its 1857 configuration.

Upon completion of the restoration work, Senator and Mrs. Hendrix will make Magnolia Manor their permanent residence.

who became a prominent doctor, and James, who was killed in the Civil War, and Eli. The following June, Mary Ann McDaniel and her two daughters followed the men by wagon train, arriving in Arkadelphia late in the summer of 1850. Mrs. McDaniel remained there until her death early in January of 1883.

John McDaniel induced Madison Griffin, a master bricklayer, carpenter and builder, to accompany him to Arkadelphia. In 1854 McDaniel placed the construction of his mansion, which was completed in 1857, in Griffin's able hands. Madison Griffin supervised the McDaniel slaves in forming and firing the brick for the foundation and chimneys. He had the slaves fell large oaks and the logs hewn for the supporting beams and joists. The pine for flooring was cut two inches thick and the interior walnut was milled locally. For the finer wood trim, Madison Griffin sent all the way to Little Rock.

By the end of the first quarter of this century, the McDaniel mansion had fallen into disrepair. Fortunately, in 1929, the late State Senator and Mrs. Fletcher McElhannon purchased the property. Mrs. McElhannon, feeling the estate needed a name more descriptive of its appearance, renamed the property "Magnolia Manor" after a huge Magnolia tree located near the front door.

In 1932, the McElhannons embarked on an extensive program of restoration and by 1933, Magnolia Manor was once again one of the grand homes of Southern Arkansas.
