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Summary

The Berryville Gymnasium is a single story, stone masonry gymnasium with a second row of windows beneath the cornice providing light to the large space within. It is designed in the Plain Traditional style with minimal Craftsman influences. Its plan is fundamentally rectangular, and its balance is only enhanced by the placement of two entrances on either long side of the structure -- directly opposite each other -- and one in the center of one gable end and two in the center of the gable end opposite. The asphalt shingle, gable-on-hip roof covers the stone walls and the continuous cast concrete foundation.

Elaboration

The Berryville Gymnasium is a single story, stone masonry gymnasium with a second row of windows beneath the cornice providing light to the large space within. It is designed in the Plain Traditional style with minimal Craftsman influences. Its plan is fundamentally rectangular, and its balance is only enhanced by the placement of two entrances on either long side of the structure — directly opposite each other — and one in the center of one gable end and two in the center of the gable end opposite. An exterior stone chimney is attached to the western elevation. The asphalt shingle, gable-on-hip roof covers the stone walls and the continuous cast concrete foundation.

The northern or front elevation is composed of two symmetrically-placed entrances -- each covered with bracketed, gable roofs -- and a row of eight-over-eight sash windows above. Three windows are placed on the first floor, to the east of the eastern entrance, and another is placed between the floors to the west of the western entrance. The row of eleven windows above light the gymnasium space within. The southern elevation opposite is a mirror-image of the northern elevation, with no discernable differences.

The eastern elevation is symmetrically-organized, with a central, double-leaf entrance separating four window bays to either side, each filled with six-over-six sash windows. The western elevation opposite is symmetrically-organized also, with two single six-over-six sash windows placed to the outside of the elevation with a central, single-leaf entrance in between. The only interruption to the symmetry is the rising stone chimney.

Though virtually all of the original windows in the Berryville Gymnasium have been replaced, the original form of the muntins has been retained, though the new muntins are decorative only.



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Otherwise the exterior is original and unaltered. It is in good condition.

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Berryville Gymnasium

In a telegram to the Berryville school board in March, 1936, Arkansas Senator Joseph T. Robinson announced that the W.P.A. had approved the construction of a new school auditorium-gymnasium, provided that \$15,434 in project funding was allocated the W.P.A.'s State Administrator in Little Rock, Floyd Sharp. Construction began on September 14, 1936, west of the existing high school buildings on the school's athletic field. The W.P.A. project initially employed 50 locals in need of work under the guidance of W.P.A. foreman Bill Anderson, who had just recently finished the W.P.A. restoration of the Carroll County courthouse. The Berryville School District's share of the construction cost was \$2,200, with the W.P.A. responsible for the balance of the estimated \$18,000 cost.¹

Work progressed as the school year continued, and in November the <u>Berryville Star-Progress</u> reported that the "ditches grow deeper, the pile of rocks grow higher, the sweat falls faster, and at last the foundation of the new gymnasium is begun." By December, the basement and walls were in place, and the gymnasium was completed and ready for occupation in the late spring of 1937, at a final cost of \$24,000.²

The Berryville Gymnasium, constructed during the period covered by the historic context The Evolution of the Public School System in the Arkansas Ozarks, 1920-1940, is a representative example of a stone school building constructed for a rural school district. Its documented construction by the W.P.A. and its use during this period as a local school building clearly identify it with this historic context and with this property type. It is significant locally under Criterion A through its direct associations with both the history of the evolution of the public school system in the Ozark Mountain region of the state during this period and the W.P.A.
