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DESCRIPTION

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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Sheeks House is a two storey white frame structure with a hipped roof. Dominating the facade is a massive two storey portico which covers the projecting center bay. The house is sheathed in white clapboard with doors, window and porch screens trimmed in black.

The three bay facade is symmetrical with the portico accentuating the projecting center bay. The portico is supported by two round columns with Ionic capitals. Ornamental brackets on the cornice of the portico are identical to those found around the cornice of the house. Beneath the portico is a one storey flat roofed porch extending across the entire facade. An iron railing spans the space between the slender round columns.

A simple entablature covers the windows on either side of front bay and on both side elevations. The projecting center bay has entries on both floors, with the second storey entry opening onto the roof of the lower porch. The main entry is especially interesting with flush board on either side of the bay facade. The panelled door is surrounded with sidelights and a transom of red etched glass.

A one and one-half storey "U" shaped wing is located at the rear (north) elevation of the house. The east leg of the "U" consists of a screened porch similar to the one storey porch on the facade. The west leg of the "U" is enclosed, as is the gable roofed rear section.

Early photographs show that the Sheeks House has been greatly altered since its original construction in 1872. Two photographs made circa 1900 show the structure as having a gable roof with a pitch similar to that of the gabled dormers on the east and west elevations of the present house. A boxed cornice with returns featured the same brackets that are preset on the house today. Though no documentary evidence is available, it appears that when the house was remodeled in early 1900 its size was almost doubled by adding a two storey addition across the rear elevation. This addition would have enclosed the one storey rear wing visible in one of the early photographs. The front portico was added about 1908.

The interior of the Sheeks House is relatively plain, with two exceptions. A two flight stairway rises to the second floor at the rear of the entry hall. Turned balusters between square posts support the handrail. The square newel post is decoratively carved and topped with a figurine. In the rear parlor the mantelpiece has Ionic capitaled columns flanking the bracketed mantel shelf. Displayed throughout the house is the present owner's large collection of glassware.

Though the original house was remodeled in the early twentieth century, the Sheeks House has remained unchanged since 1908. It retains many original features and still rests on its original site across from the Clay County Courthouse. The 1908 alteration illustrates the adaptation of a structure to changing architectual styles.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Sheeks House is an important historic landmark in the small northeast Arkansas community of Corning. The house was built in 1872 by a prominent Arkansas attorney, E. Foster Brown. In 1879 Brown moved to Jonesboro and sold his home to Edward V. Sheeks, one of Corning's early businessmen. Since 1878 the house has remained in the Sheeks family.

E. Foster Brown was born in Tennessee in 1844. At age fourteen he moved with his family to Randolph County, Arkansas. In 1862 he enlisted in the Confederate army and served throughout the Civil War. Afterwards he returned home to complete his education by studying law. Brown was admitted to the Arkansas Bar in 1871. After a year of further study in Lebanon, Tennessee, Brown began practicing law in the newly organized Clay County (On March 24, 1873, Clayton County was created from portions of Randolph and Green Counties. The name was later shortened to "Clay").

Despite his youth and inexperience, Brown was elected as a delegate to Arkansas' 1874 constitutional convention. His active participation contributed to the formulation of the document which still governs Arkansas a century later. In 1875 Brown served as state senator from the first district, and in 1878 he was elected as prosecuting attorney for Arkansas' Second Judicial District. In 1883 Brown moved to Jonesboro in Craighead County, thus terminating his political career in Clay County.

In the early 1870's Foster Brown built a two storey frame home in Corning. On the lot just west of the house was his law office. According to the present owner, Brown sold his house to E. V. Sheeks in 1878 (The present owner is the daughter-in-law of Mr. Sheeks). The house was ideally located for Sheeks whose mercantile store was located just east of the house.

Edgar Van Buren Sheeks was a native of Indiana who moved to north Arkansas as a young man. On arriving in Clay County in the late 1870's Sheeks opened a saw mill just north of Corning. Later he went into partnership with George W. Stephens to open Sheeks-Stephens Store on the northeast corner of Corning's courthouse square. Sheeks and Stephens also owned the first cotton gin in Corning. In 1906 Sheeks was manager of the electric light plant in Corning. His many successful business ventures made E. V. Sheeks an important factor in the early economic life of Clay County. Form No. 10-300a (Rev. 10-74)

The Sheeks House was originally a provincial style house distinguished by the projecting center bay. The two storey house had a one storey wing on the rear elevation, thus giving the structure an ell-shape floor plan. In 1908 the house was remodeled by adding both a two storey and one storey addition at the rear, and a two storey portico and one storey porch on the facade. The alteration of the house made it more in vogue with early twentieth century architectual styles.

Though architecturally interesting, the significance of the Sheeks House lies in its association with two men prominent in Clay County history. The house typifies the home of a successful northeast Arkansas businessman at the turn of the century.
