SUMMARY

Eastern Star Lodge 207 F&AM is a Plain-Traditional style two-story block building that was constructed in 1947. It is located approximately one and one-half miles west of St. Francis, Arkansas, on County Road 336, then approximately one-half mile south on County Road 347. The symmetrical building is constructed from concrete blocks and rests upon a concrete foundation. It has a gable roof that is covered with shingles and sheathed with wood siding in the gable end.

ELABORATION

Eastern Star Lodge 207 F&AM is a Masonic hall located approximately one and one-half miles west of St. Francis on County Road 336, then approximately one-half mile south on County Road 347. St. Francis is located in the northeast corner of Clay County in Northeastern Arkansas. The lodge was built in 1947 by local volunteers, who were lodge members, brother Masons from other lodges and individuals from the community. The building is an excellent example of Plain-Traditional architecture. It is constructed from concrete blocks and lies on a concrete foundation. The building is the only lodge building located in the vicinity of St. Francis.

West Elevation

The building faces west and is fenestrated by two six-over-six windows on the upper level. The glass in the left window has been painted over white. Entry to the building is gained through a wooden door. A gable-roofed porch supported to two wooden post shelters the entrance. To the right of the entrance was once a separate entry that was enclosed with blocks shortly after the building's construction. A black and white metal sign with the lodge's name is hung on the exterior wall and had a light at top.

South Elevation

The south elevation is fenestrated by five six-over-six windows. Three of the windows are located on the building's upper level and two are located on the bottom. There was originally a side door located on the first floor, but it was sealed off at an unknown date. A second story entryway has also been infilled and a flight of stairs that accessed the entrance was also removed.

East Elevation

The east elevation is fenestrated by four six-over-six windows, two on each story. The top two windows contain air conditioning window units. On the ground, approximately four feet from the exterior wall, is a concrete structure that served as the covering for a cistern that was dug in the 1960's. The cistern was never used and due to its construction date is a non-contributing resource.

North Elevation

The north elevation is fenestrated by six six-over-six windows; three on each story. There is also an exterior brick chimney located slightly west of center on the elevation.

Interior

The interior has been altered extensively on the first floor. It serves as a combination kitchen/dining room used for meals and other public functions. The second story is used for Masonic meetings and is quite remarkable. The alter and pillars are from the original lodge hall, a Presbyterian Church in existence from the turn of the century but which disbanded in the 1940's. Seating is vintage cinema seats with intricate detailing. The original charter hangs on the wall as well as the jewels of the state Grand Master Webb Magee, the lodge's longest serving Worshipful Master.

An area outside the main meeting hall contains numerous photos of past Worshipful Masters, special Masonic awards, a wooden cabinet to hold jewels and aprons, large plywood board that have been painted with the names of all the Worshipful Masters and the years they served.

ntegrity

Since construction in 1947, the lodge hall has undergone minor alterations, mostly for weatherization and protection of the building itself. It has continued to be used as a Masonic Hall since its completion in 1947. Although a couple of doors have been infilled, the alterations have done little to impact the workmanship employed in construction or the appearance of the building. The setting of the nearby area remains much the same as it did in 1947 with the building still located in the countryside in the vicinity of a small town.

SUMMARY

Eastern Star Lodge 207 F&AM, located in the St. Francis (Clay County), Arkansas, is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C for its local significance as the best extant example of a Plain-Traditional style two-story lodge hall building in northeastern Clay County. The lodge is also being nominated under Criterion A for its association with Masonic activities in northeast Clay County.

ELABORATION

Development of the area near St. Francis and Eastern Star Lodge 207 F&AM began following the Civil War when the land was covered with dense Delta forests and swampland. The clearing of timber created economic prosperity in the timber and river trade. Farming opportunities were created when land was cleared of timber and the swamps were drained. Many of the people settled in the Chalk Bluff Community near the St. Francis River. Chalk Bluff was the site of numerous Civil War skirmishes and battles.

The post-war settlers arriving in the area were lured by the fertile farmland. Many were Civil War veterans in search of a better life. They and their families had deep religious faith that included the belief and membership of the Masonic Order and Order of the Eastern Star. This is reflected by numerous headstones in the nearby Gravel Hill and Hall cemeteries that are etched with both Masonic and Order of the Eastern Star emblems. Many of these settlers were farmers from Tennessee, Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, and elsewhere in Arkansas. Cotton was the crop of choice.

Eastern Star Lodge 207 F&AM was organized on Dec. 27, 1867, with 30 charter members. It was chartered on Nov. 18, 1868, and is now Clay County's oldest Masonic lodge. The lodge first met at the Chalk Bluff Church, which was Presbyterian. It then moved to Star School, a small rural schoolhouse, and then to one-story Hall Church that was newly constructed. The lodge received permission to construct a second story for use as a meeting hall around 1906.

In 1946, the lodge purchased the rights to Hall Church, which had disbanded. Local volunteers constructed the present lodge hall in 1947. The cornerstone for the new lodge hall was laid in the northeast corner on May 6, 1947. Included in the cornerstone were a written history and a coin taken from the cornerstone of the Hall Church.

The lodge has been located in three counties, never more than one mile from its present location - first in Greene County, then Clayton County and finally Clay County. Clay County was formed from Greene County in 1873 and was first called Clayton County before the name was changed to Clay County in 1875.

Lodge officer installation and other public functions, such as open house and "dinner on the grounds," were once a significant part of the social activities in the area. Many were held during summer months and were celebrations in themselves.

Since its inception, the Eastern Star Lodge 207 F&AM has had approximately thirty-four 50-year members with 16 living to date. Of the 16, two are 60-year plus members - Vaughter Irwin of Pollard (Clay County), Arkansas, Master Mason in April 1938, and Ernest Hanna of St. Francis, Master Mason on May 19, 1938.

Today the building still functions as a Masonic Lodge. For many years, the lodge hall was also the meeting location for the Order of the Eastern Star. That chapter has merged with the chapter in Piggott (Clay County), Arkansas.

Significance

Eastern Star Lodge 207 F&AM is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C with local significance as the best extant example of Plain-Traditional architecture in the St. Francis area of Clay County. It is also being nominated under Criterion A for its association with Masonic activities in Clay County, Arkansas.
