


Physical Description


Characterizing this three-story-with-basement college dormitory is a verticality appropriate to its Tudor Revival inspiration. Faced with dark red brick, the building has two slightly projecting end wings with gable roofs which project from the rectangular central block which is capped with a steep gable roof. Accenting the verticality are the projecting blocks' steep gable ends with stone coping. The focal point of the facade is the ground level arcade effect created by a series of windows set in wide stone pointed arches. These are set in the central block between two doors at either end of this block. The central window in this series is surrounded by a decorative stone panel in which is inscribed the name and date of the building: "Martin Hall, 1918." The double leaf doors, also set within stone arches, are embellished with Gibbs surrounds. Decorative stone insets enrich the gable ends and the wall above the principal door. A small garden beautifies the central space formed by the two projecting wings. The many multi-paned sash windows are usually grouped in pairs and their wide limestone Gibbs surrounds create a lively; and colorful effect.


Statement of Significance


Built in 1918, Martin Hall on the campus of Hendrix College in Conway, is one of the main focal points on the small campus. The building was designed for use as a boys dormitory by the Thompson and Harding architectural firm. Influenced by the Gothic Style, Martin Hall is three-stories with a basement and is of red brick construction. Due to a need for interior renovation, Martin Hall was considered for demolition a few years ago. However, strong support for saving this historic building resulted in Martin Hall remaining a landmark on the campus of Hendrix College. The building has been restored with the aid of the original plans. A basement-level open arcade was enclosed for use as a game room. Still a boys dormitory, Martin Hall remains a functional historic building at the small private Arkansas college.
