Summary

The Guy Home Economics Building is a single-story, rectangular plan building with a projecting front porch constructed in 1936 by the WPA. This Craftsman-style building is covered by a composition-shingled gable roof with exposed rafters over a narrow frieze board and features ornamental brackets in the gable ends. The walls are constructed of structural cut stone and rest upon a continuous stone foundation. An exterior cut-stone chimney pierces the eave of the western elevation.

Elaboration

The northern or front elevation features a projecting gable roof porch near the western end. The roof, which also has exposed rafters and brackets in the pediment, is supported by two cut-stone columns that form a segmental arch. The entrance consists of double-leaf doors surrounded by eight-pane sidelights and a large multi-pane transom. Although nine windows originally fenestrated the northern elevation, the easternmost set of three windows has been boarded over, and the remaining original windows have been replaced with modern four-over-four windows.

Five six-over-six, double-hung windows light the eastern elevation. The southern elevation contains of single-leaf door entrance covered by a small, below-the-roofline, gable roof located near the eastern corner. Two small, separated, six-over-six, double-hung windows occupy the center of the elevation, and two larger, side-by-side, six-over-six, double-hung windows near the western corner complete the southern elevation. The western elevation is fenestrated by three six-over-six, double-hung windows with two positioned north of the chimney.

The building is currently in use by the Guy-Perkins School District.

Guy Home Economics Building

The Guy Home Economics Building was constructed in 1936 with local labor provided through Roosevelt's Work Progress Administration to house the Guy School District's home economics program. The Guy community made good use of locally available native materials and the funds available through the New Deal and Smith-Hughes programs to construct a variety of school and other civic buildings. The building is currently in use by the Guy-Perkins School District.¹

The Guy Home Economics Building, constructed during the period covered by the historic context *The Evolution of the Public School System in the Arkansas Ozarks*, 1920-1940, is a representative example of a small stone school building constructed for a rural school district. Its documented construction by the W.P.A. and its use during this period as a local school building clearly identify it with this historic context and with this property type. It is significant locally under Criterion A through its direct associations with both the history of the evolution of the public school system in the Ozark Mountain region of the state during this period and the W.P.A.
