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SUMMARY

To the west of and facing Highway 65 North in the Greenbrier vicinity, the Spears House is a one story mixed masonry home constructed circa 1946. It is predominantly Craftsman in style with its low pitched, front gabled roof, and overall appearance, but borrows details from other styles such as its wide boxed eave overhang, multi-level eave overhang, arched porch entrances, and quoins.

Silas Owens, an African American mason whose work was most popular from the 1930s through the 1950s, put his own distinct signature on this house seen in the herringbone pattern of the rock, and the two-in, two-out design of the cream colored brick found around three sides of the windows, doors, and louvers, and making up the quoins. His meticulous work ethic allowed no break in the rock pattern and no concrete to harden on the surface of the rocks.

ELABORATION

The rectangular framed Spears House still stands as it did in its early years, with few alterations, none of which jeopardize the overall artistic design of the house. The front and side doors have been replaced, as well as the windows. All, however, remain in the original openings, except for one, in which a smaller window has been installed, surrounded with wood slats to fit into the original opening. The two-in, two-out design of the bricks around the windows, doors and louvers remains intact even where remodeling took place. Quoins are found at every corner, and the meticulous herringbone pattern of the cut stone carries throughout the exterior of the Craftsman style mixed masonry home.

East Elevation - Porch

The front, or eastern, elevation of the house features a one-half, front gabled porch, with the northern half of the eave at a lower level than that of the remainder of the home. The porch features three cream brick framed, arched porch entrances, one to the front, and one to each side. The base of the porch is rock in herringbone pattern, and the floor is concrete. To the east, or front, of the porch, two concrete steps lead up to the floor level. Centered above the east entrance to the porch is a square louver surrounded by cream brick in the two-in, two-out pattern. Quoins are at each corner of the porch.

East Elevation - Main Living Quarters

The front of the Spears House has two sets of double hung windows. One set is under the porch, to the south of the door, while the other set is outside of the porch, to the north of the door. A louver is also centered under the gable of the roof of the main structure.

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North Elevation

The north side of the house contains four window openings. The first is a set of double hung, four over four windows, while the remaining three are single hung, one with twelve panes, and two with six over six. Between the third and fourth window opening in the westward direction is a door, and the beginning of a modern wooden deck which wraps around the corner or the house. The roof is extended over the north side of the deck. The deck does not take up a substantial amount of space, and therefore does not take away from the integrity of the house.

West Elevation

The remainder of the deck lies to the west side, or back of, the house. It attaches to a few feet of the house, ending just prior to one of two windows on the back of the house. If the deck were not attached, the back of the house would appear symmetrical. Centered on each half of the west elevation, is a six over six window. Centered just below the roof is a louver which is not bordered by the two-in, two-out brick design.

South Elevation

The south side of the house includes three window openings. The western most window (closest to the back of the house) has six panes over six. The middle window has been replaced with a smaller window, and wooden slats were used to fill in the remaining space. The last window opening contains a set of double hung, four over four windows. The south elevation shares a portion of the roof with the front porch, and the arched entrance to the porch is seen on this side.

INTEGRITY

The Spears House, built circa 1946, retains all seven elements of integrity. The house remains in its original location, which is still a residential neighborhood. The design of the house is intact, with no changes affecting the style of the builders. The one addition, the small deck on the corner of the house, does not detract from the house's appeal. The Spears House is still an excellent example of Silas Owens's work, just as it was in 1946.

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SUMMARY

Due to the excellence of the Spears House as an example of a Mixed Masonry Craftsman style home in the Greenbrier vicinity, it is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C for its architecture with local significance. Mixed masonry was at the height of its popularity for the growing middle class, and Silas Owens was at the height of his career as a masonry artist when the Spears requested his services to help build their new home. Owens featured his signature design characteristics of the herringbone pattern in the rock, cream brick quoins at the corners, and cream brick around the windows, doors, and louver, in a two-in, two-out pattern, on the Spears' home. The Spears house is being submitted under the multiple property listing, "A Storm Couldn't Tear Them Down: The Mixed Masonry Building of Silas Owens, Sr., 1938-1955."

Elaboration

Thoughts of a new home began for W.S. and Tressie Spears after the birth of their first child. Thoughts, however, were all they were, as W.S. was called to serve in World War II just ten days after their first son was born, leaving Tressie to care for him alone, saving money all the while, waiting for W.S.'s return.

When W.S. did return, he and his uncle, Frank Battles, began construction on the home adjacent to Highway 65 in Greenbrier. When the time came for the outer walls of the house, W.S. and Battles began digging rock from the hillside across the highway from the house, and solicited the help of mason Silas Owens of Twin Groves. Owens, by then, had helped build many houses, churches, and businesses in Faulkner County, and was well known for his talent.

The Spears lived in the home from 1946 until 1978, while W.S. owned and operated an upholstery shop on the property. They raised three children in the home before moving to Greers Ferry where W.S. pastored a church. Upon retirement, the Spears returned to Greenbrier, but do not live in the same residence.

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VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

From the southwest corner of the Republican Road West and US 65 North intersection, proceed southeasterly 1280 feet along the southwest side of US 65 North to the point of beginning. From the point of beginning, proceed southeasterly 165 feet, thence proceed southwesterly 185 feet, thence proceed northwesterly 165 feet, thence proceed northwesterly 185 feet to the point of beginning.
