### SUMMARY

The James and Jewell Salter House was constructed circa 1945 in Greenbrier. Well known Faulkner County rock mason, Silas Owens, Sr., was engaged to apply the stone veneer. Among the collection of homes rocked by Owens, this building stands out as an unusual example of the English Revival style.

### **ELABORATION**

The front, eastern façade of the Salter House features a pair of six-over-six double-hung windows at the southeast corner. The single-leaf entry of the home is centered in a slight, gabled extension and flanked by a narrow single-light casement window to the south and a chimney to the north. The chimney is angled on the north side to follow the slope of the gabled roof. A brick and stone panel runs down the throat of the chimney and it is topped by two terra cotta chimney pots. The main wall of the house then steps back and is fenestrated by a single-light picture window. A concrete patio extends from the house under the casement window to the northeast corner.

The north elevation is fenestrated by a pair of windows at the northeast corner and a single window at the northwest corner. The north wall of a rear, gabled wing features a single window. A gabled brick addition and carport lined with open trellis work has been appended to the rear wing.

The rear, western elevation is fenestrated at the northwest corner with a single window. The rear wing displays a pair of windows adjacent to the brick addition. The southern window has been

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boarded up. The brick addition beneath the carport contains a single-leaf door and two-over-two aluminum double-hung window.

The southern elevation is fenestrated west to east by a pair of windows, a centered single window and a second pair at the southeast corner of the home.

### SUMMARY

The James and Jewell Salter House in Greenbrier, constructed circa 1945 is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance under Criterion C as a good example of an English Revival influenced Mixed Masonry residence. The Faulkner County home was constructed and veneered by master craftsman Silas Owens, Sr., and features the creative stone coursing emblematic of Owens' work. The nomination is also being submitted under the multiple property context, "A Storm Couldn't Tear Them Down: The Mixed Masonry Buildings of Silas Owens, Sr., 1938-1955."

### **ELABORATION**

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James Milton Salter and his wife, Jewell were typical of the rural families of Greenbrier in the mid-1940s. Both had been raised in the Faulkner County towns of Greenbrier and Wooster and they remained in the county until their deaths. James Salter was a farmer, raising cotton and corn and running a dairy business as well. The Salters also owned a general store on US 65 outside of Greenbrier.

Silas Owens, Sr., was hired to apply the rock veneer to the Salter's home as they were familiar with his work and knew the quality product attributed to Owens. The Mixed Masonry style was chosen by the family because they felt that it would withstand the tornadoes that the area was prone to. Owens brought in the rock for the house from a local quarry on Batesville Mountain where he obtained much of his construction materials. A small brick addition with adjacent carport was applied to the rear of the home circa 1970s; however, it is not visible from the front of the house and thus does not detract from the original mid-1940s English Revival style.

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James Salter died in 1981 and his wife continued to live in the house until her death in 1994. The home has remained vacant since 1994 but it is well cared for by the Salter's daughter, Mary Milum Milum a retired employee of State Farm Insurance and her husband Ed, who worked for International Paper before his retirement reside in a modern home to the west of the Salter House.

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The James and Jewell Salter House is being nominated to the National Register under Criterion C with local significance as a good example of an English Revival influenced Mixed Masonry featuring the superior craftsmanship of Silas Owens, Sr. South Broadview, or US Highway 65, has been widened bringing it closer to the house through the years; however, the home maintains a rural farmhouse feel as it is situated in an area of minimal development and is surrounded by relatively open land to the north and widely spaced housing and businesses to the south. A small addition to the rear is not visible from the front of the house and it otherwise maintains its original massing and architectural elements. This nomination is also being submitted under the multiple property context, "A Storm Couldn't Tear Them Down: The Mixed Masonry Buildings of Silas Owens, Sr., 1938-1955."
