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Description:

The Charlton Bathhouse is located within the Charlton Recreation Area along U.S. Hwy. 270 east of Mt. Ida, Arkansas. The bathhouse is a one story, rock structure with a one bay, central front porch supported by four large wooden posts. The structure is composed of three sections, a large center section and two small end sections. The small sections on either end originally had doors in them; however, these have since been filled with natural stone. Each section has a gabled roof in a straight line with the end sections being lower than the main gable. The porch has a simple shed roof. All roof areas are covered with composition shingles. The entrance to the structure is a set of double doors located on the porch area. The only windows on the structure are louvered vents. It also has two large sets of louvered vents on the front of the structure, a single vent on each end, and a series of vents across the back. The structure rests upon a continuous stone foundation and has the sloping exterior corners distinctive of CCC structures. United States Department of the Interior National Park Service

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The Charlton Bathhouse was constructed circa 1938 by members of the 741st Company of the Arkansas CCC District stationed at the Crystal Springs Camp that was located close nearby. It was constructed as part of a small, public recreational complex within the Ouachita National Forest (ONF) as a result of the CCC's emphasis upon recreational construction that began in earnest circa 1935. The extant historic structures within this complex include only this bathhouse and a spillway/dam (nominated separately), both of which allowed the area to function purely as a swimming and picnicking facility, as it continues to do today. As such, the Charlton Bathhouse remains significant through its associations with the contributions to American social history made by the Civilian Conservation Corps, its associations with the emphasis upon outdoor recreation that guided such construction, and its status as an excellent example of CCC recreational architecture in a remarkable state of preservation.
