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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Doherty House faces west on Malvern Avenue. The area is of mixed commercial and residential development with the remaining residences catering to boarders. 705 is a corner lot and on the adjacent lot to the south is another large house of the Victorian Period.


The structure is a two and one-half story Victorian dwelling of irregular plan. The roof is gabled with finials on gable ends and bracketed eaves. The foundation is of rusticated stone.

The front (west) elevation is composed of a flat roofed porch which runs the length of the elevation. The porch is supported by six Ionic columns. Above the porch is a centered bay. Above the centered bay is an open pediment dormer. Within the dormer is a recess containing a Paladian styled window. The dormer has box returns and a railing which creates a small porch area. Two similar dormers rest on two story bays on the north and south elevations. Their recesses are less deep and there is no porch rail. On the southwest corner is a round two story tower which ends in a conical roof with finial. Running from the tower to the bay on south is a porch with a centered round projecting bay. This porch is supported by Ionic columns.

The entrance on the west has a glass-panneled door with leaded glass sidelight and transom. Windows on this elevation, as well as the center window on the lower level of t south bay, are leaded. The two side windows of the front dormer are leaded. Other windows are one over one.

The interior is unaltered. The house contains original woodwork, some elaborate. All door hardware, plumbing fixtures and light fixtures (converted from gas) are original.

The exterior has been sided in aluminum. Festooning near the cornice of the tower is missing, as well as the balustrades on second story balconies and atop the west and north porches. There is a shed addition on the rear.

TATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Doherty House is a large, two-and-one-half story, late-Victorian residence which is disinguished, primarily, for its architectural significance.

Built in 1907 for Thomas H. Doherty at 705 Malvern Avenue in Hot Springs, Arkansas, he Doherty House was once one among several impressive dwellings lining Malvern Avenue. owever, the residential character of the section of Malvern Avenue containing the Doherty ouse has, in recent years, changed to one of a mixed commercial and residential nature and he remaining homes, with the exception of the Doherty House, now present a weathered, deeriorated appearance.

Thomas Doherty and his wife, the former Nina Cascoldt, arrived in Hot Springs from nati in 1334. The Garland County Record, a yearbook printed by the Garland County ical Society, states that the plans for the Doherty House were actually drawn up by Doherty and that she supervised the construction of the house. Later, the Dohertys uilt rental cottages (now gone) to the rear of the Doherty House. The Record indicates hat these were among the first cottages built for rental use in Hot Springs. In effect, hey were the direct antecedents to the motel in Hot Springs; Arkansas' premier resort city. n inspection of the second floor of the House revealed that each of the bedroom doors was umbered and the bathroom was labeled "bath." The brass letter plates were old and indicate hat presumably at some period early in the history of the building the second floor was ented to boarders.

The architectural significance of the structure is based on two factors; 1) the elabrateness of both the exterior and interior detailing; and 2) the completeness of both nterior and exterior architectural features. There is one major alteration to the structure. he exterior has been sheathed in aluminum siding. The siding has not, however, necessitated he removal of any important exterior trim features, nor has it greatly compromised the visal integrity of the structure.

The house follows an irregular plan with prominent classically detailed, one-story orches attached to the north and west (front) elevations. A rear (east elevation) two-story orch of later date has been enclosed.

The roof is gabled with ornate finials on gable ends. Bracketed eaves are set below he roof. The foundation is of rusticated stone.

porch area. Two similar dormers rest on two-story bays on the north and south elevations. On the southwest corner is a round two-story tower which ends in a conical roof. Running from the tower to the bay on the south elevation is a porch with a centered round projecting bay. This porch is supported by Ionic columns.

The western entrance has a glass-paneled door with leaded glass, sidelights and transom. Stained glass and leaded windows are found on the south, west, and north elevations, including an oculus on the north side.

The interior, with the exception of the original painted canvas wallpaper, is basically unaltered. The house contains an impressive array of original woodwork. A doublewide, wooden sliding door separates the foyer from the front parlour. The foyer also contains a large stairway and paneled window-bay. A smaller stairway is located in the rear of the structure. Most rooms have either wainscot paneling or chair rails.

All door hardware and most lighting fixtures are original. The plumbing fixtures dafrom an early period during the history of the house. The original gas lighting fixtures were converted to electricity and the early push-button electric switches remain. What appear to be the original bathroom wall tiles and floor terrazo remain.

Aside from the addition of the siding, the most noticeable alteration to the exterior or interior of the structure is the absence of some festooning which originally graced the upper section (below the cornice) of the building's corner tower.

At present the Doherty House is unoccupied, however, concrete plans have been developed for its future use. The building will be used as office space for the Crisis Intervention Center of Contact, an emergency service program of the Ouachita Regional Counseling and Mental Health Program. Contact is subsidized by various levels of government. Harry Woodall, the director of Contact and currently listed owner of record for the building, has assured the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program that the original appearance of the interior will not be altered in the process of transforming it into office space. Furthermore, if possible, funds will be allocated for the purpose of restoring the building.
