





Physical Description

The two-story central block of this building is capped with a low hipped roof with prominent overhanging eaves. The structure is faced with tan brick and features two long, slightly recessed, side wings of one story. A horizontality is created through simple lines of the low roof line of the central block, the long side wings and the broad front porch upheld by sturdy brick piers and capped by a simple railing. French doors at the second story open onto the porch roof. Long low gable-roofed dormers with louvers line the roofs of both the central block and side wings. The sash windows have six-over-one lights.

Statement of Significance

Designed in 1928 by the Thompson, Sanders and Ginocchio firm, the Interstate Orphanage in Hot Springs has continuously functioned as an orphanage since its construction. Craftsman in influence, the building emphasizes horizontal lines and features prominent overhanging eaves. A two-story central block is flanked by one-story wings. A one-story portico supported by brick piers marks the entrance. Set on a large expanse of lawn, the building is unique in its neighborhood of small homes.
