Summary

Located at 534 Park Avenue in Hot Springs, the building that now houses Bailey's Dairy Treat was originally Butchie's Drive-In. The building was built circa 1952, as a late example of Art Moderne architecture. This style lent itself to the new drive-in restaurant building type, with its rounded corners, slick lines and neon lighting. The building is in excellent shape and has undergone few alterations, primarily to the interior.

Elaboration

In addition to the rounded corners, slick lines, and neon lighting that embody the Art Moderne style, the 'ucco wall finish and corner windows also emphasize the "streamlined" look of Moderne design. The rojecting overhang on three sides, with the radiused corners at the front, provides excellent cover for the two one-over-one service windows at the front of the building. The building's other four windows are all single-pane stationary windows. The four corner windows and the two service windows were replaced during a remodeling in the past two years. The new windows match the historic windows in size and do very little to detract from the building's historic appearance. The kitchen equipment was also updated and replaced with new equipment at that time.

The interior layout is close to original, with the new kitchen equipment being in approximately the same location as the original. The addition of a new walk-in cooler is the biggest change to the kitchen. The interior walls are painted concrete block. The floor is the original quarry tile, with a few patches of new tile installed when the remodeling was done. The original bathroom is pretty much intact, with tile on the floor and walls. There is very little ornamentation, in keeping with the Art Moderne style.

The building housing Bailey's Dairy Treat retains most of its original historic integrity and appears largely as it did in the early 1950's, making it an excellent example of a historic drive-in restaurant designed in the Art Moderne style of architecture.

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Summary

Butchie's Drive-In is being nominated under Criteria A and C with local significance as an important resource to highway and transportation-related architecture in Arkansas between the years 1910–1965. Butchie's, circa 1952, is one of the few remaining examples of the drive-in establishments that catered to tourists along Park Avenue during the peak of tourism in Hot Springs. Having undergone minimal alterations, mainly enabling the building to continue to serve as a food establishment, Butchie's Drive-In is a fine example of Art Moderne architecture.

Elaboration

atchie's Drive-In was built at 534 Park Avenue as the conversion from large residential homes to commercial businesses aimed at automobile travelers began in the mid to late-1930s and continued through the 1950s. Beginning with the completion of the paved Little Rock-Hot Springs highway (Highway 70) in 1925, Park Avenue being the final stretch into "the Spa City," residents of Hot Springs and Park Avenue saw an opportunity to "make a buck" off the growing automobile traffic that the highway guaranteed. In addition to being a convenient stop en route to Dallas, Texas, Hot Springs thrived as a tourist destination. Known primarily for the healing powers of the thermal waters that flowed from its hillsides, Hot Springs also boasted alligator and ostrich farms, a horse-racing track, several theaters, and two amusement parks during its visitation peak. As a result, traveler services, including tourist courts, eating establishments, and service stations, began appearing along Park Avenue because of its proximity to the highway, as well as Hot Springs' major attractions and entertainment venues.

The Art Moderne styling of Butchie's Drive-In was highlighted by the stucco exterior, streamlined façade, and neon lighting. Its central location on Park Avenue made it accessible to both automobile and pedestrian traffic, and provided a quick, yet stylish stop for those "on the road."

Early records of Butchie's Drive-In are vague, with the primary identifying information coming from the City Directories of Hot Springs. The building first appears in the 1952 Hot Springs Yellow Pages, and then in the 1953 City Directory, but does not cite an owner or builder. The building has continually served as a food establishment under various names since its construction. Despite the lack of information available, it appears that little to no alterations have been executed, with the exception of minor updating to the kitchen pliances. The original floor plan of the kitchen is still in use, as are most of the interior materials.

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By the early-1950s medical advancements made drugs more readily available for ailments previously treated with thermal baths, resulting in the decline of visitors to the city. Unlike their tourist court neighbors on Park Avenue, eating establishments did not suffer because of the decline of tourism. The population of Hot Springs continued to grow so that restaurants and eating establishments along Park Avenue were not affected to a very large degree.

Butchie's Drive-In is being nominated under Criterion A with local significance because of its role as a prime example of traveler services located along Park Avenue serving automobile travelers along the Little Rock-Hot Springs Highway. It is also being nominated under Criterion C as an excellent example of a simple Art Moderne style building. The nomination is being submitted under the multiple property listing "Arkansas Highway and Transportation Era Architecture, 1910-1965" in conjunction with the historic intext "Arkansas Highway History and Architecture, 1910-1965."


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
