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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Morrison Plantation Smokehouse was constructed ca. 1854 as part of a since razed plantation complex. The building plan is a perfect hexagon. The exterior bearing walls (there are no interior partitions) are of native stone randomly laid. The eight-planed hip roof is capped by a gablet louvered on two elevations (north and south) to form a smoke exhaust.

The roof framing system is supported by two large wood beams springing from the stone wall at the eave height. These beams are at a right angle to the ridge line of the gablet. From lower on the walls and at a right angle to the supporting beams are an identical set of beams evidently for hanging foodstuffs: to smoke.

The only entrance is by a low (five feet ten inches) but wide (four feet six inches) door on the west elevation. The door is made of a double thickness of diagonal wood planks with a peripheral wood frame.

The smokehouse has suffered few alterations through the years. The original wood shingled roof has been replaced by galvanized, corrugated sheet iron and a concrete floor has been poured over the original one of packed dirt.

The old smokehouse stands now to the rear of a later dwelling, its unusual plan shape and silhouette form a sharp contrast with the simpler, more modern of the house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

ETSIGNIFICANCE

The Morrison Plantation Smokehouse is the last structure surviving from a large, ante-bellum plantation complex developed by Daniel Morrison, Built ca. 1854, the hexagonal-shaped, rock smokehouse is also an important example of plantation architecture.

Daniel Morrison, a native of Georgia, acquired huge sections, amounting to over 60,000 acres, of the south-central Arkansas wilderness in the mid-19th century. Morrison was a slave owner and used black labor to clear a 300 acre tract on Water Mellon Island, at that time a large land mass surrounded by the Ouachita River and a tributary slough. On this estate Morrison supervised slaves in the construction of a frame, fourroom, central hall, Greek Revival dwelling and several other buildings, including a group of slave cabins along the nearby Military Road, a small, oxen-powered cotton gin, and a sturdy,rock smokehouse. Since 1945 the smokehouse has been the only tangible reminder of the early existence of the plantation.

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The smokehouse is formed of randomly laid field stones capped by a modern corrugated iron roof. Only one aperture, a doorway located on the west elevation, breaks the surface of the building's exterior walls. The door is diagonally set wood planks, and the original hinges are still in place. There are no partitions on the inside of the building. Three tiers of beams, used for hanging meat, date from the original construction of the smokehouse, but the original packed dirt floor has been covered with poured concrete.

The present setting of the smokehouse retains a couple of characteristics reminiscent of its original environment. The surrounding country is still farm land and the military road, now a paved highway, still runs to the west of the building. However, the road is no longer a major thoroughfare to the southwest, as it was in the 19th century. New buildings including a farm house, wash house and chicken house have replaced the earlier plantation structures on the lot occupied by the smokehouse.

The Morrison Plantation Smokehouse provides a small glimpse of 19th century plantation life. The eightsided ruck building is an unusual architectural survival from pre-Civil War Arkansas; and built by slaves, the structure represents one facet of the by-gone, feudal-like, self-sufficiency of the antebellum south.
