DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The T.H. Dearing House originated c. 1890 as a one-storey frame house in Akron, Arkansas. In 1901 the house was moved about five niles to its present site. In 1914 a second storey was added which was architecturally in keeping with the original section. Dated photographs show that the first storey has remained unaltered since its construction. The exterior of the two-storey structure has remained virtually unchanged since 1914.

The Dearing House is a two-storey, Victorian-style residence. The ell-shape of the two-storey section is modified by one-storey porches and projections on the south and West elevations. The basic floor plan has a central hall with four rooms on the South and two rooms on the north. The four room, second-storey addition lies above the east rooms.

The house is sheathed in narrow clapboard with narrow vertical boards at each corner and a wide baseboard over the upper portion of the stone foundation. Windows on the first storey are long and narrow with four-light double-hung sashes and a simple cornice. Upstairs windows are two-light sash with cornices identical to the lower window cornices.

The most interesting features of the house are the open porches on the east (front) and south elevations. Decorative woodwork cut in intricate patterns gives the porches their distinctive appearance. Trim on the two first-storey porches is identical. Square posts with a turned section in the middle divide the porches into bays. Handrails rest above jigsaw-cut balusters. Brackets on the porch posts are cut in a sunburst-like pattern and terminate in miniature pendants. Spindles in each porch bay are set between a scroll pattern above and a serrated pattern beneath. Though similar, the second-storey porch is less intricately trimmed than the first-storey porches.

Other interesting features include the two-storey bay on the facade and the patterned woodwork set into the east and southeast gable ends. The multi-gable roof is capped with cresting.

Because it has been continually occupied by members of the family, the Dearing House has been well cared for and remains in excellent condition. The house rests on a spacious tree-shaded site, an appropriate setting for the community's most architecturally interesting structure.,

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In 1854 a post office was established at Big Bottom in Independence County, Arkansas. As a commercial port on the White River and a stagecoach stop between Jacksonport and Batesville, the community grew into a small but relatively important commercial center. Its name was later changed to Akron.

when the railroad passed north of Akron through the Newark community, the decline of the earlier settlement began. After reaching its peak population in the 1880's the community began to diminish in size and commercial importance. Around the turn of the century several fires destroyed most of its business district, thus hastening Akron's demise.

Today the only physical remains at the site of the old Akron community consist of the cemetery, which overlooks the White River; however, one structure originally located in Akron, but since moved, is still standing. The T.H. Dearing House, built in Akron about 1890, was moved to Newark in 1901. This house symbolizes the general movement from river ports to railroad depots which occurred often in late nineteenth-century Arkansas. Moreover, the Dearing House is tangible evidence of Newark's ties to Akron.

The Dearing House was built by Thomas Hindman Dearing as a residence for his large family. Though the exact construction date is not known, descendants of the builder concur that it was probably constructed about 1890. In 1901 Dearing moved both his family and his house to the nearby community of Newark.

Dearing was a farmer who was active in Independence County politics. From 1894 to 1898 he served as circuit clerk for Independence County, and in 1911 he was appointed sergeant-at-arms for Arkansas' 38th General Assembly. The house he built for his eight children is now owned by his youngest daughter, Mrs. Lena Dearing Shipman.

The Dearing House is a white-frame, Victorian-style structure which, in 1914, was enlarged by the addition of a second storey. Several features give the house its distinctive appearance; these include the ornately trimmed porches on the east and south elevations, a two-storey bay on the east facade, metal cresting on the roof and decorative woodwork set into the gable ends. Besides being the most architecturally significant structure in the Newark community, the Dearing House is also one of the oldest still standing.

Architecturally, the Dearing House is one of the most important Victorianstyle structures in Independence County. Built by a farmer and politician,

Moving the house from a declining to a growing community represented the shift in population brought about by the railroad. The Dearing House, as the last surviving structure from Old Akron, is a continual reminder of Newark's heritage from the older community.
