Summary

The Pine Ridge School is one-room, stone-constructed building covered by a tin-sheathed gable roof. Located south of Izard County Road 237 approximately one-half mile west of Brockwell, the Pine Ridge School Building is in good condition with few alterations since construction. It is now used by the Seventh Day Adventist Church for their services.

Elaboration

The Pine Ridge School is a rectangular-plan, one-room building constructed c. 1920 in a style reminiscent of later WPA-constructed school buildings. Uncoursed, native sandstone with "grapevine" mortaring is utilized for both the foundation and the walls. The side-gable roof has unenclosed eaves, though the rather small exposed rafters are not emphasized, and is covered by the original corrugated tin. There is one interior brick chimney on the southern elevation; a central interior brick chimney has been removed.

The front, or northern, elevation contains a central projecting gable-roof porch supported by square brick columns on stone piers with a poured concrete floor. Two wood posts, which abut the rear wall, add support to the porch roof. The gable end is filled with stucco in an unusual fishscale pattern, but is otherwise unadorned. Underneath, double-leaf, five-panelled wood doors allow access to the interior. The large, elliptical-arch lintel is constructed of poured concrete and features the words "PINE RIDGE" in raised concrete letters with the "N" backwards. On either side of the porch is a single four-pane, wood-frame casement window with a concrete lintel and sill positioned symmetrically near the eave.

Neither the eastern nor the western elevations are fenestrated; however, both feature the fishscale-patterned stucco in the gable ends. The rear, or southern, elevation is composed of a small one-over-one double-hung window to the west and two groups of three larger one-over-one double-hung wood windows. All of the windows on the building are protected by chain-link screens.

The interior has plastered walls and a double-beaded board ceiling. A raised stage at the western end has been enclosed with a light framework covered by imitation-wood panelling. No original school chairs remain, and church pews are currently used for seating.

Summary

The Pine Ridge School near Brockwell is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance as the best example of a stone-constructed one-room school building in that area of Izard County.

Elaboration

Little is known about the history of the Pine Ridge School or the date of construction. The one acre of land it sits upon was deeded on July 10, 1898 to the School District No. 78 by Thomas H. and Barbara E. Allen with ". . . the privileges of all denominations in the county preaching in said house, when not interfering with school in said house." Some of the local residents, perhaps referring to the above-referenced warranty deed, assert that the structure is 100 years old. Architecturally, however, the Pine Ridge School does not reflect turn of the century Ozark school construction techniques, which were usually of frame construction (or, in a few instances, of coursed stone) with an end gable orientation. With its side gable, projecting-gable front porch plan, this school is more reminiscent of the school buildings erected by the Works Progress Administration and the National Youth Administration (both of which had camps in Izard County) although there is no record of either of these program's involvement in the Pine Ridge School construction. Other architectural details which suggest a 1920's - 1930's date include the brick columns on stone piers, the extensive use of concrete in the porch floor and the window lintels and sills, and the original tin roof with exposed rafters. The presence of the wood-frame four-over-four windows is somewhat puzzling as they are usually found in late 19th century residences and buildings in Arkansas; however, scattered deviations from this pattern are not that uncommon in rural areas, and it is also conceivable that they were salvaged from an earlier structure.

It is known that the nearby town of Brockwell, the youngest in Izard County, was created a year after the completion of the Batesville-Mammoth Spring highway with the establishment of a post office on February 1, 1926. The town was named for George Brockwell, who operated a store there and owned the forty acres on which the town was built. His daughter-in-law, Ethel Brockwell, served as postmaster for many years beginning in the 1940's According to Ms. Brockwell, the Pine Ridge School was already "several years old" at the time of the establishment of the town and post office in 1926. Based on this information and our architectural assessment of the building, the AHPP staff decided upon the c. 1920 date of construction for the school.

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The Pine Ridge School, which is now being used by the Seventh Day Adventist Church, is being nominated as an amendment to the *Public Schools in the Arkansas Ozarks*, 1920 - 1940 multiple property nomination and is significant under Criterion C as the best example of a stone-constructed school from that era in the Brockwell vicinity.
