Summary

Located on 2nd Street in Lewisville, the Triplett Co. Building is a twostory, brick masonry commercial office building designed in the simple panelbrick style popular for such early twentieth century construction.

Elaboration

Located on 2nd Street in Lewisville, the Triplett Co. Building is a two-story, brick masonry commercial office building designed in the simple panel-brick style popular for such early twentieth century construction. Its rectangular plan is augmented only by a modern metal awning that extends across the southern or front elevation and a wooden exterior staircase attached to the western elevation. Two short brick flues rise from the parapet near each of its northern ends. The built-up tar roof and brick walls rest upon a continuous brick foundation.

The southern or front elevation is fenestrated with four symmetrically-placed window bays in the upper story and two large storefront windows in the wall below that flank a pair of symmetrically-placed single-leaf entrances. The storefront windows are composed of four large stationary panes below eight smaller panes that form a sort of transom. The six-over-one windows in the second story are capped with a raised brick parapet that features delicate panelled cornice detailing. The eastern elevation is blank on the first story and fenestrated with four windows above, while the western elevation is fenestrated with two windows on the second story placed to either side of the second story entrance and wooden staircase. The northern elevation contains four windows on the second story and two central windows in the wall below, with a single-leaf entrance placed to the west and a filled entrance to the east.

Also included is the associated gable roof, metal storage building located immediately to the rear of the main building. Though its exact construction date is not known -- and though it has surely been resheathed since its original construction with the corrugated metal that appears on the building today -- oral history supports the contention that it is at least 50 years old.

The Triplett Co. Building is in good condition.

Elaboration

Built c. 1915, the Triplett Co. Building was built as a lumber company office during the boom years of the lumber industry in Lewisville and the surrounding area. The arrival of the Cotton Belt Railroad years before had provided the necessary means for shipping the heretofore-inaccessible and vast supply of timber and by the first decades of the twentieth century the timber industry here had grown dramatically. The Triplett Co. Building is thus associated with the historic context Railroad Era Resources of Southwest Arkansas (Lafayette, Little River, Miller and Sevier Counties), 1870-1945 by virtue of its direct associations with growth experienced in Lewisville as a result of the arrival of one of the railroads that played an influential role in the growth and development of Lafayette County. It is thus significant under Criterion A as one of the few surviving commercial buildings in

Lafayette County constructed during the boom in the timber industry brought on by the arrival of the railroad years before; it is also significant under Criterion C as the best surviving example of a panel-brick commercial puilding in Lewisville.
