Constructed in 1908, the Logan County Courthouse in Paris is one of the area's most architecturally significant structures. The two-storey brick building rests above a full basement of gray cut-stone. Exceptional features include brick quoins at each corner, classical porticos on three elevations and a clock cupola surmounting the low hipped roof.

The native stone foundation has simple rectangular windows on each elevation and a cast-stone water table above. The upper stories of both the north and south elevations have three sets of paired windows. Over each pair is a single semi-circular arched head with keystone. All other windows around the building have flat arched heads with alternate voussoirs. The entablature of the building features a frieze with dentils and a cornice with simple rectangular-block brackets.

The north elevation and south facade are almost identical. Both are seven bays wide with the three center bays projecting slightly from the wall surface and marked with brick quoins. A pediment is set into the parapet above the north center bay. The south center bay is covered by a twostorey classical portico supported by four round columns set on square bases. The entablature of this white portico is identical to that surrounding the building itself. The same pattern of dentils and simple block brackets is repeated in the pediment.

Both the east and west elevations are five bays wide and feature classical porticos identical to the south portico. The central entry beneath each of the three porticos consists of double doors beneath a wide transom. (These class and aluminum doors are new additions, c.1950.) Flanking the panel above each transom are wide scroll brackets. Each entry is capped with a pediment which is identical in style to those on the porticos.

Rising a full storey from the center of the roof is an octagonal clock tower. Of frame construction, this small tower has an entablature similar to that of the building. The north, south, east and west sides of the tower have a round clock face set beneath a small boxed-cornice gable. A decorative paneled finial rests atop the clock tower.

Though the interior of the structure was remodeled in 1950, the original foyer and central hallway floor was retained. Small hexagon-shaped tiles are set in circular and star-shaped patterns giving the interior halls a colorful appearance.

The courthouse rests on a square in the center of the small Paris business district. Its size and classical style combine to make the courthouse an architectural landmark in the county.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The largest number of architecturally significant public buildings in Arkansas are the courthouses scattered over the state's seventy-five counties. As the center of local politics the courthouse is often the largest and most costly building in the county. Such is the case with the eastern district courthouse in Logan County. This large brick building in Paris is the oldest of the county's two courthouses.

Though originally named for State Senator John N. Sarber, Logan County was renamed in 1875 to honor a pioneer settler, James Logan. The county was created on March 22, 1871, from portions of Franklin, Johnson, Scott and Yell Counties.

A temporary county seat was established at Reville in 1873. Two years later appointed commissioners located the permanent county seat in Paris. In 1901 a second county seat was established at Booneville to serve the southwest part of the county.

The present courthouse was erected in 1908 and is the most architecturally important structure in Paris. The red brick building is trimmed in white and features a decorative octagonal clock tower. Classical porticos are located on three elevations and give this rectangular structure an especially impressive appearance.

Resting on the court square in the Paris business district, the courthouse and surrounding lawn have long served a central role in the civic and social life of the community.
