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Description:

The Jack Creek Recreation Area is located in south-east Logan County on Forest Service Road 141 along Sugar Creek. The bathhouse is a single story rectangular structure constructed primarily of fieldstone and resting upon a continuous stone foundation. The structure is divided into three sections of relativity equal size. The north and south sections of the structure are enclosed dressing rooms that consist of a door on the exterior end of the pen and open windows on the east and west sides of each dressing room. The center section of the structure is open with solid walls on both the north and south sides which constitutes the interior walls of the dressing rooms. The roof of the structure is a simple gable covered with the composition shingles. The roof is supported by large log beams. The structure has no chimney.

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The Jack Creek Bathhouse was constructed circa 1936 by members of the 1707th Company of the Arkansas CCC District stationed at the Waldron Camp that was located just to the south. It was constructed to serve as a public recreational facility within the Ouachita National Forest (ONF) as a result of the CCC's emphasis upon recreational construction that began in earnest circa 1935. This bathhouse served swimmers and campers visiting the Jack Creek Recreation Area, and is the only CCC-constructed facility of record at this location. As such, the Jack Creek Bathhouse remains significant through its associations with the contributions to American social history made by the Civilian Conservation Corps, its associations with the emphasis upon outdoor recreation that guided such construction, and its status as an excellent example of CCC recreational architecture in a remarkable state of preservation.
