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SUMMARY

Located at along Highway 197 in New Blaine, Arkansas, the Freeborn Lasater House is the best example of Craftsman style home in the small community. Freeborn Lasater built the house with help from his wife and children. Construction began on the home in 1928, but took over six years to complete. The house is a one story Craftsman Bungalow constructed primarily of field stone. To give the house a more unique appearance, petrified wood and Native American stone tools that were found by the family at the building site were incorporated into the building's masonry. The home sits on a continuous stone foundation and is sheltered under a gable roof. A small weatherboard addition is located at the back of the house. The date of the addition was not documented, but we know the addition was completed shortly after the house was originally constructed.

ELABORATION

Located along Highway 197 in New Blaine, Arkansas, the Freeborn Lasater House is the best example of raftsman style home in the small community. Freeborn Lasater built the house with help from his wife and children. Construction began on the home in 1928, but took over six years to complete. The house is a one story Craftsman Bungalow constructed primarily of field stone. To give the house a more unique appearance, petrified wood and stone Native American tools that were found by the family at the building site were incorporated into the building's masonry. The home sits on a continuous stone foundation and is sheltered under a gable roof. The house features a full front porch with the letters F T L, the builder's initials, written in rock in the gable end of the porch roof. The house is in excellent condition and has been changed very little since its construction was completed.

Front

The house faces west toward Arkansas Highway 197. A full front porch dominates the elevation. The porch is covered by a gable roof that is supported by a pair of small wood columns atop large rock piers. The house is fenestrated by two four-over-one double-hung windows. The two front windows are separated by a centrally located front entryway. The letters F T L are spelled out in the stonework in the gable end of the front porch. The initials are that of the house's builder and original owner, Freeborn T. Lasater.

South Elevation

The south side of the house is fenestrated by two three-over-one double-hung windows. This is followed by a small side projection containing three more three-over-one windows. The last fenestration on the original stone portion of the building is a three-over-one window. The rear portion of the elevation is made up of the weatherboard-sheathed addition. There are no windows located on the south side of the addition.

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East Elevation (Back)

The rear portion of the building is composed entirely of the weatherboard addition. The exact date of the addition is not known, however through conversations with long time residents of the town, it has been established that the addition was made shortly after the house's original construction. A single doorway sheltered by an awning provides rear access to the house. The elevation is also fenestrated by five two-over-two double-hung windows.

North Elevation

The back portion of the north elevation is part of the addition and is fenestrated by a pair of two-over-two double-hung windows. Moving west along the elevation, the house is fenestrated by two small three-over-one windows. Continuing west, a projection fenestrated by three three-over-one windows is located near the center of the elevation. Two more three-over-one windows are separated by the building's native stone exterior chimney on the easternmost part of the elevation.

Site Features

One site feature is still located on the property, a native stone open well. The well is topped with a large slab stone with a hole in the center. The well is still usable today, unlike many that have been capped for safety reasons.

Integrity

The Freeborn T. Lasater House posses a high degree of integrity as its workmanship and elements are still evidenced on each elevation of the building. The workmanship and materials are true to the style and craftsmanship of the small town's gifted stonemasons. The location and of the building remains unchanged giving the building a strong sense of place.

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SUMMARY

Located along Arkansas Highway 197 in Logan County, Arkansas, the Freeborn T. Lasater House is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance under Criterion C as the best example of a Craftsman style house in New Blaine, Arkansas. The house has been altered very little and uses native stone mixed with artifacts found at the house site to give it a very unique appearance among other stone buildings in the town. The house is also being nominated as part of the multiple property listing: Historic and Architectural Resources of New Blaine, Arkansas: 1920-1940.

ELABORATION

Freeborn Lasater was a merchant and stone mason in the town of Blaine. The town of Blaine began shifting from the north side of Shoal Creek to the south side of the creek when the railroad made plans to come through the area on the south side of the creek. Eventually the location of the rail line lead to the demise of Blaine and the growth of New Blaine. Lasater, like the rest of the town moved closer to the railroad. When it ame time to build a new home for his family, it would be in New Blaine.

Construction began on the Freeborn T. Lasater House in 1928. The family worked on the home as money and time would allow. It would be six years before they finally completed their home. The construction was a family affair. Freeborn, his wife Hattie, and their six children all worked on the family's home. When the exterior was complete to the point where it provided adequate shelter, the family moved into the unfinished house. The family lived in the home with nothing but dirt floors until they could afford to finish out the interior.

The home was finally completed in 1933. The Lasaters's then built a small gas station that was operated by their son Troy. With the strained economy of the Great Depression, the service station failed. By the late 1930s the family had left Arkansas for a fresh start in California.

After the Lasater's left for California, Steve Robinson occupied the house. Mr. Robinson lived there until the late 1940s. The next resident of the house, Gene Parker, lived there for only a short time. Sometime shortly before 1950 the Fisk family bought the house. Rena Fisk lived there until poor health forced her to sell the property to Mary Gehring in 1978. Ms. Gehring still owns the home today and uses the house as a rental property.

Statement of Significance

The Freeborn T. Lasater House in Logan County, Arkansas is being nominated to the National Register of iistoric Places under Criterion C with local significance as the best example of a Craftsman style house in the town of New Blaine. It is also being nominated as part of the multiple property listing: History and Architectural Resources of New Blaine, Arkansas: 1920-1940.
