DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Church Building now known as the Powhatan Methodist Church was built in 1872. It is a one story frame structure with a gable roof. The front door way, which is the only entrance to the building, is located in the center of the east facade and has double doors with a transom. Two double hung sash windows on each side flank the entrance. There are two cloak rooms, one on either side of the foyer and two doors leading from the foyer to the sanctuary. The north and south sides of the building have three windows each. The west side has two windows. All windows are identical to those at the entry. There is a brick flue at the east wall of the sanctuary and a stove which is part of the original furnishings. The roof has approximately a sixteen-twelve pitch and presently has composition shingles over the original wooden shingles. The exterior is covered with simple wood clapboard having a plain frieze board, simple corner boards faintly resembling pilasters and a simply molded box cornice.

The structure rests on a stone foundation. The concrete and stone front steps have eight treads and eight risers and stone and concrete railings.

The interior contains a flat ceiling which has hooks to hold bronze chandeliers that contained four oil burning lamps each. One of the chandeliers remains and has been converted to electric light. The interior has simple and plain wood floors, walls, and ceiling. There is a simple molding around the interior head, jamb and sill of the windows. The pews and a pump organ are part of the original furnishings.

A housing for a bell has been added to the exterior of the east end of the north wall in recent years.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The earliest records of the Powhatan Methodist Church appear in the <u>Methodist Conference Journals</u> in the year 1858. In that year Powhatan was a part of the Jacksonport District, Arkansas Conference, with 284 members and 4 local pastors. William R. Foster was the assigned pastor. In 1859 the churches were rearranged on the Powhatan Circuit for they reported 181 white members, 49 "probationers," and 13 "colored" members (as they were called.) From 1860 to 1864 Powhatan was served by pastors F.W. Thacker, J. M. Clayton, Moses C. Morris, and William R. Foster. Records show Powhatan and Pocahontas Station in 1871 with 31 members and T. Robinson as pastor. Tradition has it that the church members met in worship services down on the river front (Black River). No records can be found as to what type of building these worship services are held in. As was the custom in the early days to building was used for church and school; then perhaps a log building was used for the early Powhatan Methodist Church.

Records from the Arkansas History Commission show the present Powhatan Methodist Church was established in 1872, the year the present building was built. On July 19, 1874, John A. Lindsay and Martha A. Dindsay, his wife; Asa T. Lindsay and Sallie W. Lindsay deeded the present church property for the sum of 310.00 to Champ P. Stuart, Frances M. Wayland, William T. Rainey, menry T. Wickershaw, and Charles A. Stuart, as Frustees of the Methodist Spiscopal Church, South.

Colonel George Phorosburgh, one of the greatest laymen Arkansas Methodism ever produced was Superintendent of the Methodist Sunday School at Powhatan around 1890. While living at Powhatan he practiced law and was identified with every phase of Church work, many times serving in the absence of the pastor to conduct a funeral. Colonel Thorosburgh served in prominent positions in the Batesville District Conference and the White River Conference and 1899 assumed the business management of the Arkansas Methodist. Elisha Theodore Vayland, son of Jonathan Wayland (for whom Wayland Springs near Imboden, thransas, was named), followed Thorosburgh as Superintendent of the Sunday School and served until 1895.

Powhatan Methodist Church served as the only church in 'awhatan up until the mid-1880's. Up till that time citizens of all miths, "singers and non-singers," attended church in the present building. The Church was the focal point of the town. Weddings, baptisms, and funerals of outstanding citizens of Powhatan were held in the church.

The church was the scene of many quarterly church conferences. It served as the setting for the marriages of Clay Sloan and Kitty Matthews and Ethel Maude Matthews and Ashley G. Saffell. The Methodist Missionary Society was an active organization of the church and served the town as well. In 1868 the John P. Morton Company, Louisville, Kentucky, presented the Powhatan Methodist Church a large, beautifully engraved Bible, which is still a part of the antique furnishings of the building.

Church members traveled by foot, in wagon, and on horseback to attend worship services in the Powhatan Methodist Church. A wooden board walk than ran by the northwest side of the church led many people up to wooden steps into the chruch building. The wooden steps of the building were later replaced by cobblestone steps. Two small cloak rooms on each side of the entrance foyer served to hang cloaks, shoes and hats. Later these cloak rooms served as Sunday School classrooms. Two antique bronze chandeliers held four oil-burning lanterns each that were used to illuminate the sanctuary until electricity became available. A church bell was purchased and used to summon the beginning of the worship services. Except for these later changes the church building appears the same as it did back when it was first constructed.

Early church members included: B.F. Matthews, Colonel George and Margaret Thornsburgh, Elisha T. Wayland, E.T. Wayland, F.M. Wayland, Henry T. Wickershaw, George O. and Mary Jung, Charles A. Stuart, Champ T. Stuart, William and Luvenia Matthews, J.R. Wells, Tom Cravens, Ashley and Maude Saffell, Buelah Matthews, Bessie LeMay, Marjorie Rowsey, William R. Wayland, Clay and Kitty Sloan, J. W. Martin, William T. Rainey, Mrs. L.B. Poindexter, Luther and Ida Belle Flippo.

E.T. Wayland, son of Elisha T. Wayland, was appointed Presiding Elder of the Paragould District in 1928 and was able to pastor and hold church conferences in the church of his childhood at Powhatan. As the State of Arkansas' Methodist Church organization changed, the Methodist Church at Powhatan changed its title from Methodist Episcopal Church South to the Powhatan United Methodist Church.

This beautiful old building is located approximately 300 feet from the Powhatan Courthouse, which is already on the National Register of Historic Places, 150 feet from the Powhatan Jail House, 300 feet from the Powhatan School House, which at one time formed the central life of Powhatan, a once thriving, river town. It continues to serve the town of Powhatan and Arkansas Methodism with religious services still held in the building. The church building stands proud as a reminder of the contribution religion played in the rural life of Arkansas and is especially worthy of notice.
