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SUMMARY

The Wallace Adams Service Station was constructed c.1929 and is a good example of filling stations of this era. The one-story brick building is the only remaining historic gas station on the Arkansas side of downtown Texarkana.

ELABORATION

The building at 523 E. 3rd was constructed c.1929 as an auto service station. The building is located on the northeast corner of the intersection of S. Laurel and E. 3rd Streets and is one-story, of brick construction and covered by a flat tar built-up roof with brick parapet. The building is rectangular in shape and rests on a continuous cast concrete foundation and has brick walls.

the front (southeast) elevation of the building faces E. 3rd Street. A single entry door and large plate-glass window are covered by a flat roof projection over the former gas service bay, supported on the outer edge by large square brick columns. The parapet of the front side of the roof of the projection rises slightly in the center, adding stylistic detail to the simple building. The wall of the building under the car bay projection features a single plate-glass window topped by a pair of four-light transom windows. The adjacent door is wood with a single light glass pane in its upper one-half. A stationary transom window is located above the door. A single nine-over-three hopper window punctuates the center of the front elevation. Two garage bays are located on the southwest end of the front. Two metal-frame overhead doors with fifteen glass panels open into the garage area of the building.

The southwest elevation of the building contains two large openings with sets of metal hopper windows. The northeast side of the building features a single metal hopper window and wood-paneled door with transom. The rear of the building contains four window openings, now infilled.

INTEGRITY

The Wallace Adams Service Station presents a good example of a 1920s service station with service bay and overhead doors. The building remains virtually unaltered from its original appearance and is a significant component of the mixed uses in Texarkana's historic downtown. The building is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance under Criterion A for its representation of commercial development in Texarkana and under Criterion C for its architectural integrity.

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SUMMARY

The Wallace Adams Service Station is a significant representation of the commercial development in downtown Texarkana, Arkansas. Constructed c.1929, the building is the only remaining example of an early automobile service station constructed in the central business district of the city. The building possesses local significance under Criterion A as a good example of the varied types of businesses historically constructed in Texarkana's downtown in this era. It is also locally significant under Criterion C as a good example of a brick service station utilizing elements of popular 1920s architectural designs in its brick patterns. It is consistent with the criteria established in the associated property type, Historic Buildings of Texarkana, Arkansas (see Texarkana multiple property group cover, Section F) and is being submitted under the multiple property listing "Historic Buildings of Texarkana, Arkansas, 1873-1958".

ELABORATION

The early history of Texarkana is inextricably linked to construction of the railroad to the area. The city of Texarkana grew out of construction camps that were established at the western end of the Cairo & Fulton railroad line and the eastern end of the Texas & Pacific line. The railroad companies began selling lots near the rail lines on both the Arkansas and Texas sides. Texarkana sits astride the boundary between Arkansas and Texas and is formally two cities in two states. State Line Avenue runs through the middle of the combined business section of Texarkana. Situated in the extreme southwest corner of Arkansas, Texarkana is less than thirty miles from Louisiana. It is fairly accepted that the name of Texarkana was derived from the three states.

The coming of the railroad to southwest Arkansas opened the opportunity to harvest the vast timberlands of southern Arkansas. The railroads enabled the lumber to be shipped to distant markets and local industry boomed. Nearby farmers also found the railroad presented opportunities for them to ship cotton and other products. The railroad also brought an influx of new residents to the town. Those who had invested in the railroad and timberland in the area gained great wealth and were able to build substantial businesses and homes in the town.

As an important railroad junction, Texarkana grew rapidly from its beginnings in 1873, and by the 1920s was a major railroad hub in its tri-state location. The downtown flourished with hotels, restaurants, and entertainment for the traveler. Texarkana is laid out along the angle of the railroad tracks with Union Station straddling the southern end of State Line Avenue and the Federal Post Office and Courthouse on the northern end. Although laid out in a grid pattern, the streets of downtown Texarkana run diagonally, northeast to southwest. Warehouses and industrial buildings were located along the rail lines on Front Street, many of which have been razed. Broad Street, one block north of Front Street, became the center of business and retains much of its historic built environment on both the Arkansas and Texas sides.

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In the first three decades of the twentieth century, Texarkana grew and prospered. The economy of Texarkana, like the rest of the country, suffered during the Great Depression of the 1930s, but rebounded during the years of World War II. Construction of the Red River Army Depot and the Lone Star Ammunition Plant and the importance of the rail lines for transportation of military personnel, goods and supplies caused business and employment in Texarkana to remain stable during the war years.

Texarkana continued to experience growth after the end of World War II as the city continued to spread. The center of commerce remained downtown until the 1960s, when U.S. Interstate 30 was constructed to the north of the city limits. Systematically, growth and relocation to the new transportation corridor affected the growth patterns of the city as many downtown businesses relocated near the new highway. However, pwntown remained and continues to remain the governmental center of the city with the presence of both municipalities' city halls, and Federal government offices. Although not still the vibrant retail business center it once was, downtown Texarkana still retains much of its historic commercial fabric.

The Wallace Adams Service Station was built at a time when the economy and growth of Texarkana was booming. The 1920s saw significant expansion of the city and the construction of new amenities to accommodate the widespread use of automobiles as the major mode of local transportation. Immediately adjacent to a residential area, the building harmonizes in scale and materials. The Wallace Adams family lived in a house (razed) that was located immediately next door.

SIGNIFICANCE

The Wallace Adams Service Station is the only historic service station remaining in downtown Texarkana, Arkansas. Its architecture reflects the 1920s when filling stations were designed to harmonize with neighborhoods. The 523 E. Third Street Filling Station is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance under Criterion C for its stylistic brick detail and under Criterion A for its association with the development of Texarkana. The building is being submitted under the multiple property nomination Historic Buildings of Texarkana, Arkansas, 1873-1958.
