Physical Description

This large two-story house presents an imposing sight situated as it is amidst a rolling green lawn atop an elevated site. The American Foursquare house, faced with weatherboards and set on a high brick foundation, features the characteristic high hipped roof with flared eaves. Another characteristic feature is the two-story three-sided bay appearing on the front elevation. In this house, however, a front porch and separate side porch substitute for the usual wrap-around front porch. These porches are supported by Tuscan columns and feature a full entablature enriched with dentil molding. Large curved brackets line the eaves offsetting the adjacent three-sided bay. Not one, but two dormer windows with decorative segmental pediments pierce the roof on the front elevation. Decorative iron cresting embellishes the apex of the roof. The front door features a beveled plate glass; the windows are sash variety with one-over-one lights.

Statement of Significance

The Colonial Revival LoBeele House in Brinkley, Arkansas was designed by Charles L. Thompson ca. 1910. Situated on an oversized lot in the residential area of town, the house is an imposing and important structure in Brinkley. The Lo Beele House is a two-story frame house which deviates slightly from the typical Thompson Foursquare design. The house features separate front and side porches rather than the usual wrap-around porch, and two separate dormers with decorative segmental pediments mark the front roof. Iron creating marks the apex of the hipped roof. The spacious setting which is slightly raised above street level combined with a version of Thompson's Foursquare designs make the Lo Beele House an important historic home in Brinkley.
