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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Layton Building, constructed in 1906, was built to house the Layton Department Store and the Bank of Yellville. It is a twostorey rectangular structure of resticated stone. The east (front) facade is composed of five irregularly placed flat-arched bays on the first storey and six irregularly placed segmental arched bays above. Windows on the other three sides are irregularly placed. The four entrances on the ground floor level are inset walls meeting at a 45degree angle from the facade. The cornice above the first floor is of a pressed tin fleur-de-lis design. The cornice atop the building is also metal with brackets and bosses. The upper bays have been infilled with metal screens and four of the nine lower bays have altered infills.

The walk-in vault with the original safe inside still remain a visual reminder of the time the building served as the Bank of Yellville. One of the most unique aspects of the Layton Building is in the bank section of the structure. The floors are of black and white marble, which show the effect of thousands of nervous feet as they stood before the cashier. Another feature of the building is the elevator which was hand driven until 1952 and is still operable today.

The interior ground floor was originally divided into two main areas, the department store and the bank. Other areas were stairways, a coal shutter and dock area for loading and unloading. The main level of the building conatins 9,240 wquare feet of floor space. There is a horseshoe shaped mezzanine floor over the rear one-third of the main level and along both side walls extending some ten feet over the department store adding display area for this function of the building. The department store was divided into sub areas such as hardware, groceries, liquor, clothing and notions.

The bank was divided into a bank lobby, tellers area, and a vault and rear office. The mezzanine floor was suspended from the bottom of the second floor with steel tie rods and two steel poles secured in the basement and reaching up to support the second floor in the middle. The ceilings throughout the building are of a unique pattern manufactured by a local planning mill.

The Layton Building contains a total of 18, 480 square feet plus the mexxanine section. The two-storey building measures 140ft.X 66ft. and stands as a local landmark in Yellville, Arkansas.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Since the early twentieth century, one of the largest and most prominent buildings in Marion County, Arkansas has been the Layton Building, located on the square of the small mining town of Yellville in the Arkansas Ozark Mountains. Significant in its representation of a turn-of-the-century commercial structure in a small mountain town, the Layton Building stands as a local landmark.

First construction on the Layton Building was started in 1903 with the digging of the basement and laying of the foundation. Building was disrupted in 1904 due to the death of one of the owners, but resumed in 1905 by Mr. A.S. Layton and finished in 1906. The contractor on the job was C. A. Jones who had built the Marion County Courthouse. The huge limestone blocks were guarried on what is now the Scott Cowan Farm, located about one mile northeast All materials used in construction of the building of Yellville. were moved by horse and mule teams. Due to the size of some of these stones it was necessary of use a mule and pulley system to place them. The pit marks of the tongs are still visible on the face of the stone. The Donum Brothers were in charge of the masonry work and were by all accounts masters at theri work. The lines and trueness of this building and others worked on by the Donum Brothers still attest to their workmanship.

The Layton Building has been used on the main floor lovel as a department store, general store, bank and United State Post Office. The upper level has housed several attorneys, doctors and dentists, among them J.C. Floyd who later became a Congressman.

In recent years the building was used in filming the movie "Bloody Mamma".

Plans have been made by the present owners and occupants of the Layton Building to restore it to near its original condition, thus restoring a landmark to the town square in the small mountain town.

That part of the NE¹/₂ of the NW¹/₂, Section 9, Township 18 N., Range 16 W., bounded and described as follows: Starting at the northeast corner of said forty, run thence south with the west line of Mill Street 63 feet and 6 inches to the northeast corner of what is known as the Layton Store and Bank Building for the point of beginning of the tract being described; run thence south with the west line of Mill Street 66 feet to the north line of Main Street; thence west with the north line of Main Street 170 feet; thence north parallel with the west line of Mill Street 66 feet; and thence south 89 degrees and 45 minutes east 170 feet to the point of beginning, being the same lands as those referred to in prior deeds of conveyance as Lot 1, Block 1, Town of Yellville and the same lands as those referred to in prior deeds of conveyance as beginning at the intersection of the north line of Main Street with the west line of Mill Street and running thence north 66 feet; thence West 170 feet; thence south 66 feet; and thence east 170 feet to the point of beginning, which lands are situated in the Town of Yellville.
