Summary

The Eros School Building is a single-story building of an irregular plan constructed circa 1935 in the Plain Traditional style of architecture. The composition-shingled gable roof features Craftsman exposed rafters and covers structural cut-stone walls, which rest upon a continuous cast concrete foundation. Two interior brick chimneys protrude from the eastern elevation.

Elaboration

The front or western elevation features a central inset porch covered by a projecting gable roof with a stuccoed pediment and a louvered attic vent. Slender wood columns support the roof and rest upon the raised concrete deck, which is accessed by six concrete steps. Two single-leaf doors with four-pane transoms are located at each corner of the stuccoed rear wall. The exterior corners of the porch are quoined with brick. A six-pane stationary window is located near the eaves on each side of the porch. Two nine-over-nine, double-hung windows are symmetrically placed between the stationary window and the corner on each side of the porch.

The northern elevation consists of a wing covered by a projecting gable roof with a stuccoed pediment and a louvered attic vent. The wing is flush with the eastern elevation and approximately four feet recessed from the western elevation. There are no windows in the northern elevation.

The eastern elevation contains a set of six nine-over-nine, double-hung windows positioned near the northern corner. A set of five identical windows are located to the south with a doorway and a nine-pane transom instead of the sixth window. Two six-over-six, double-hung windows are found near the southern corner. The southern elevation is identical to the northern elevation.

The stage was located in the southern wing. The building is currently unoccupied.

Eros School Building

The decline of the mining industry in Marion County and the concomitant loss of population had stabilized by the 1930's, and most of those who remained returned to the subsistence farming and isolation that had been common in the past. Nevertheless, the Depression's effects were felt even in isolated Marion County, and the federal work relief construction (no record of the identity of the specific agency in charge has survived) in 1935 of a new school building in Eros provided needed employment to many local residents.¹

The Eros School Building, constructed during the period covered by the historic context *The Evolution of the Public School System in the Arkansas Ozarks*, 1920-1940, is a representative example of a large stone school building constructed for a rural school district. Its use during this period as a local school building clearly identifies it with this historic context and with this property type. It is significant locally under Criterion A through its direct associations with the history of the evolution of the public school system in the Ozark Mountain region of the state during this period.
