DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Situated in the center of Osceola is the Mississippi County Courthouse which can be viewed from any part of the city. On the premises are numerous large trees and shrubbery, a monument dedicated to Judge William J. Driver, one dedicated to the Confederate Veterans and a sign which tells of the County seat's origin. The structure is of the Neo-Classical style.

The first floor was once used as the Mississippi County Jail. There are no windows and the walls are constructed of plaster. The floor is laid with a beige colored tile and there are seven rooms presently used as storage space and offices.

The second floor contains nine offices which have eight foot double hung windows with 1/1 light_S There is a double staircase which is symmetrical about the north and south axis and meets at a central landing on the third floor. The stairs are constructed of narble and the railing is of wrought iron with a wood hand rail. The floor is truly the work of a well-experienced tile decorator. It is constructed of inlaid ceramic tile.

. The walls are wain-scot with the lower portion being marble and upper portion being plaster. The walls are twelve feet in height with plastered ceilings.

The third floor offices have eight foot double hung windows with 1/1 lights. There are five eight foot double hung windows with 36/36 lights located on the center south wall. The floor is distinctive with inlaid stone of an oak leaf design. The Courtroom is decorated with terra-cotta cornicing and exposed beams. The beams have Roman olive branch decorations it each end. The floor of the Courtroom is carpeted with a light green level looped carpet

The Courthouse Square is landscaped with an abudance of large oak trees and shrubbery. In the center front are two wrought iron lamps which are situated on either side of the front steps. The front has a full portico entrance with six thirty foot high, three foot in liameter, _______, fluted Ionic columns. The exterior walls of the Courthouse have face prick extending to the foundation. Located beneath the roof's eave, terra-cotta decorations reach completely around the building. At each side is a one bay entrance with stone steps and wrought iron hand rails. The foundation of the Courthouse is one hundred feet long by fifty four feet wide. It is ten inches thick and constructed of stone.

The most distinguishing feature of the building is the roof. The east and west sides are gable shaped. The flat center section supports a solid copper dome. The dome is surrounded with terra-cotta decorations. Large round polished insets adorn each of the four faces of the dome.

The appearance of the Courthouse dome was altered some twenty years ago. Severe leakage through the dome onto the third floor forced County officials to paint it with asphalt paint. This action has detracted somewhat from the aesthetic qualities of the Courthouse, but the pasic architectural beauty of the Courthouse is still evident.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Osceola Courthouse, built in 1912, is significant for its fine architectural work on the interior and exterior portions of the building. The interior floors and exterior walls ure of an embellish design. The stone tiles used to construct the floors and the terra-cotta decorations on the exterior are very rare to this area. Before the present Courthouse was built, Court was held in a very small wood frame building. As the County grew in population lounty officials found it necessary to construct a larger more suitable Courthouse. The old lourthouse was located in old Osceola, which is now the extreme east portion of new Osceola. The Honorable Judge William J. Driver, who was County Judge in 1912, donated a plot of land upproximately one acre in size to construct the new Courthouse. The plot of land is located lirectly in the center of new Osceola.

There are few if any buildings in this area that have such great detailed architectural The materials used are also of significant value. The columns and decorations which surround the building are constructed of terra-cotta, an unglazed clay that is rarely seen in this area. This is the only public building in the entire County that is decorated with this brownish-orange material. The floors are truly the work of an artist, carefully placed in a unique pattern are eight inch baked stone tiles. The various colors are red, blue, green and pink on the second floor, green, gray, rust and black on the third floor. In arger cities of this area one would not find floors of such design and beauty.

Located on the east side, across the street, is the Osceola Times building, the oldest building in Osceola. On the south side, across the street, is Fred G. Patterson's general store. Erected in 1902, this building remains without alterations in its original state. These two buildings contribute to the historical value of the Courthouse.

The Osceola Courthouse remains in its original state with the exception of the copper lome, which has been painted with asphalt paint due to leakage.
