Jumary

The Confederate Section, Oakland Cemetery, is an area of less than one acre within Camden's Oakland Cemetery at Pearl Street and Adams in Camden. It contains some 231 marked burials of Confederate dead, both known and unknown, within an iron chain fence. A tall stone monument stands in the western part of the section.

Elaboration

The Confederate Section, Oakland Cemetery, is an area of less than one acre within Camden's Oakland Cemetery at Pearl Street and Adams in Camden. It contains some 231 marked burials of Confederate dead, both known and unknown, within an iron chain fence. A tall stone monument stands in the southwestern part of the section.

The white marble gravestones are arranged in 33 rows that are seven deep, except where blocked by the monument. The burial area is surrounded by an iron-chain fence.

The centerpiece of the Confederate Section is a granite monument, approximately 18' tall and 4' 3" wide and deep. The monument consists of several two broad blocks topped by an inscribed section beneath an obelisk with a cannon ball on top. This in turn sits atop a rough fieldstone base roughly 3' high and 5' wide and deep.

The monument is inscribed as follows:

The east face says: WE CARE NOT WHENCE THEY CAME,/DEAR IS THEIR LIFELESS CLAY/WHETHER UNKNOWN OR KNOWN/TO FAME,/THEIR CAUSE AND COUNTRY STILL/THE SAME/THEY DIED - AND WORE THE GRAY./ERECTED/MAY 29. 1886.

The west face says: "IN MEMORIAM"/1861.-1865./OUR/CONFEDERATE/DEAD.

Both the sculpture and base show missing caulk or mortar and the sculpture is spattered with bird guano, exhibiting black crusts and organic growth, and showing evidence of sugaring. Elaboration

By mid-June 1865, organized Confederate resistance in Arkansas had ended and all major military commands had surrendered to victorious Union troops. Shortly thereafter, a Memorial Association was formed in Camden, a town briefly occupied by Federal troops during the 1864 Red River campaign, to honor the Rebel dead buried in the city cemetery.

The group worked immediately after the war to mark the some 250 Confederate graves, which even then were becoming hard to identify. An obelisk was prected in the largest group of graves and inscribed "Unknown Dead."

The memorial association held its first public decoration day on November 9, 1866. Following a speech by Methodist preacher Rev. Horace Jewell, a large group of citizens, including 75 women clad in white and bearing wreaths of flowers, proceeded to the cemetery where the Hon. E.A. Warren spoke and a Rev. Wheat conducted devotional exercises. The plot was then bedecked with flowers.

The Memorial Association protected the Confederate plot until 1886, when a Confederate Monument Association was formed. This group erected a larger, more substantial granite monument, which was dedicated on May 29, 1886. Dr. J. W. Meek, chairman of the Confederate Monument Association, made the presentation speech. Mayor C. K. Sithen also spoke and Gov. S. P. Hughes made an oration.

Though Camden's Hugh McCollum United Confederate Veterans Camp and Grinstead Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy erected a more elaborate monument on the Ouachita County Courthouse lawn in 1915 (Camden Confederate Monument, NR 5/7/96), the Confederate Section, Oakland Cemetery is the historic resource most closely associated with the activities of the early Camden memorial association and the later Confederate Monument Association and is thus deserving of recognition on the National Register of Historic Places.
