Built in 1847 by Peter McCollum, this home was sold to Colonel John T. Chidester around 1857.

The plan is rectangular with smaller wings on the East and West wing of the main house. The main house is one and one-half stories.

Of wood frame construction, the house is raised on brick piers with pierced brick underpinning between the perimeter piers. The structure is finished with horizontal, beveled siding.

A veranda which extends the width of the main house, is supported by massive columns that reach to the underside of the cornice. The flat architrave and frieze are recessed slightly behind the column face. The columns, with moulded bases, rest on square pedestals.

The roofs of both smaller wings and of the main house are gabled with plain, close rakes.

The main windows are double hung sash, with a pattern of 9  $\times$  9 lights, and have flat surrounds with corner blocks. They are shuttered with louvered blinds.

The entrance doors are double with glass lights, with moulded surrounds and within a moulded architrave containing sidelights and transom. The light refractions caused by the variations in thickness of this glass add an interesting visual effect.

The two main chimneys are stucco covered brick and are outside ended. One is offset left, the other is offset right.

The scale and visual strength of this home are impressive. The rooms have 12 foot high ceilings and the main house is over twenty feet high from ridge to ground.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The McCollum-Chidester house is one of the finest and best preserved examples of ante-bellum architecture in Arkansas.

Although the Greek Revival style appeared to predominate Arkansas architecture in the second quarter of the 19th Century, this home was a refreshing departure from the rule. It is more characteristic of plantation homes found in Southern Maryland and Virginia in the late 1700's and early 1800's. The strength of its columns, its surprising scale and its quiet symmetry create an atmosphere of beauty and dignity.

John T. Chidester was born in New York City on December 1, 1818. He moved to Georgia when a young man and became engaged in carrying the mail overland. After operating mail stage lines in Georgia, Alabama, and Mississippi, Chidester moved to Camden, Arkansas in 1857. Since his business required his presence in Washington, D. C. frequently, he became acquainted with such prominent political figures as Henry Clay, John C. Calhoun, and Daniel Webster.

During the Civil War Chidester continued to carry on his business, or business of some sort. There is no proof that he ever served in the Confederate Army, in fact, his obituary and the Official Records of the Union and Confederate Armies imply that he did not serve in any military capacity.

In the Spring of 1863, Chidester was engaged in an attempt to effect an exchange of Confederate cotton for Federal provisions and supplies. Several Arkansas members of the Confederate Congress approached Secretary of War James A. Seddon in Richmond about the matter. On March 12, 1863 Seddon signified his approval of the plan in a letter to General E. Kirby Smith, even though such



trading with the enemy was ordinarily forbidden. Chidester was described as "reliable, loyal, and of adequate means, having peculiar facilities, from his position as a former planter on the river and his past connections and business, to accomplish successfully the ends proposed." Chidester, as the official contractor, stood to make a handsome profit from this deal with the Yankees.

Very soon after the end of war Chidester secured permission from General Orme, U.S. Treasury Agent in Memphis. to collect Confederate cotton in the Camden area for delivery to Federal authorities. One-fourth of the cotton in pounds, or a fourth of its value when sold, was to go to Chidester for his services. Brigadier-General G. F. McGinnis, in command at Camden, regarded Chidester and his kind as thieves and swindlers. On June 9, 1865 McGinnis wrote to Colonel John Levering, Assistant Adjutant General of the Department of Arkansas, that "Chidester . . is quite notorious as a former Government mail contractor in this country. I presume you have heard of him. If not, the Attorney-General can give you all the information in regard to him. I think the whole thing is wrong, and in Chidester's case I have determined that he shall not touch a bale of Government cotton . . The appointment of these outsiders is a regular swindle. Chidester tells me that he can make \$100,000 out of it in sixty days."

Chidester secured his fattest government contract in 1878 when he became president and general manager of the Arkansas, Texas and Pacific Mail Company. Some 300 men, 2000 horses, 60 Concord coaches and a cavalry detachment were required to carry the mails from Ft. Worth, Texas, to Ft. Yuma, Arizona Territory, a distance of over 1500 miles. Out of this operation came the famous Star Route Fraud cases in 1881, a scandal which almost wrecked the administration of President Garfield and carried over into the Arthur era: Apparently Chidester did not figure as one of the principals in the defense, but his obituary refers to him as the "Star Router". He died in Camden on March 6, 1892.
