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The Major Tappan House was constructed approximately 1892. It is the typical Queen Anne style with a round corner tower with cap and finial, an inset balcony with low balustrade, a curved veranda with spindles and elegant slender columns, and oriels. An overall quaintness is apparent in the small scale of the bracketed cornice with decorative panels, and the use of scalloped shingles in a wide band between the first and second stories and on the corner tower. Slender proportioned window casements with simple trim are subordinate to the finer features of the exterior.

This refinement is carried to the interior with ornamental latticework in interior openings, symetrically moulded trim with corner blocks about all fenestration, and elaborate fireplaces with overmantels of cherrywood. Colorful tile is set about the fireplace openings. Of special note in the interior is the three run enclosed stairwell. The staircase of dark paneled woodwork, finely turned balusters, and intricately carved posts is accented by warm yellow light penetrating the side and transom tracery windows of the front entry.

In general, the Major Tappan House gives the appearance of being a complex shape with its numerous offset surfaces. However, it is essentially a central hall plan of two and one-half stories with a high hipped roof. The roof is penetrated by several dormers, two of which give the appearance of being oriels in that they pierce the soffit and are supported by elongated brackets at either side. The only alterations to the house have been a kitchen added to the rear and an enclosed porch along the entire back of the house.

The house is raised approximately four (4') feet above grade on a brick foundation on the front elevation, which increases to a full basement depth at the rear due to a sloping grade. There are two possible explanations for raising the house. Water drainage was a problem in early Helena, and an aboveground basement would have protected the rest of the house from possible water damage. It is suggested that the kitchen which is connected to the house by the enclosed porch, was originally located in the basement. The first explanation bears more credence that the latter. EINSTRUCTIO

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The James A. Tappan House is representative of a wealthy Arkansas businessman's home at the turn of the century. This large Victorian structure was built about 1892 to house one of Helena's most prominent families. It stands today as a visible reminder of the Gilded Age in eastern Arkansas.

James Alexander Tappan (1847-1914) was born in Tennessee. At age 16 he joined the Confederate army, was promoted to major within two years and earned the Bronze Cross of Honor. Following the Civil War he became a civil engineer, and his work for a railroad brought him to Helena to survey the Arkansas Central Railway running from Helena to Clarendon. Major Tappan liked Helena and decided to settle there permanently.

Throughout his adult life Tappan tested his business abilities in many fields, and was successful in all. After completing his work with the railroad he took over the Helena Gas Company and added to it an ice house, purported to be the second ice house to open in the South.

In 1882 Major Tappan established the Tappan Coal Company, a business that is still a family operation today (1974). As the local representative of a Pittsburg dealer, Tappan sold coal to Mississippi River steamboats and packets which stopped at Helena to refuel. He also sold coal to homes and businesses in Helena and surrounding towns.

The Tappan Hardware Company was founded in 1888 and was one of Arkansas' largest at the time. Major Tappan was a stockholder in one Helena bank, and a director in another. He was also interested in agriculture and managed his own farm untilohis death.

This versatile businessman was also popular in the community. In 1899 over two hundred Helena voters signed a petition asking that Major Tappan be a candidate for mayor. The Major acquiesced, and was elected without an opponent; however, he was most unhappy in his new and unsolicited role, and resigned the office after serving only six weeks.

In 1874 Major Tappan bought the property on Columbia Street. The house which now bears his name was built to replace a smaller residence which burned about 1890. Lyle Brothers, a highly regarded contracting firm in Helena, built this elegant residence.

Major Tappan's home is significant because it is a fine example of Victorian architecture in eastern Arkansas, and because it exemplifies the private residence of a successful Arkansas businessman at the turn of the century. · . J
