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SUMMARY

The Castleberry Hotel is located at 61 Main Street in downtown De Valls Bluff, Prairie County, Arkansas. The two-story building represents a good example of the Craftsman style, exhibiting masonry porch piers, wide eaves, and exposed rafter tails, all hallmarks of the style. The building rests on a continuous cast concrete foundation, has brick walls, and is topped by a hipped roof covered in asphalt shingles.

ELABORATION

The Castleberry Hotel is located at 61 Main Street in downtown De Valls Bluff, Prairie County, Arkansas, and is approximately fifty miles east of Little Rock. Main Street is also U.S. 70, the main highway between Little Rock and points east before I-40 was constructed. The two-story building, which was built in 1925, represents a good example of the Craftsman style, exhibiting masonry porch piers, wide eaves, and exposed rafter tails, all hallmarks of the style.

The building rests on a continuous cast-concrete foundation, has brick walls, and is topped by a hipped roof vered in asphalt shingles. The first floor of the building housed the lobby and restaurant while the sleeping oms were located upstairs. The first floor of the building is rectangular in plan while the second floor plan is U-shaped in order to allow light into all of the rooms.

In addition to the hotel building, a gable-roofed, concrete-block storage shed is located behind the building and also contributes to the nomination.

Front/Southeast Façade

The front façade of the hotel faces U.S. 70 (Main Street). The first floor of the building is divided into three sections. The southernmost section of the building has a storefront with plate-glass windows and a recessed central entrance. A row of wood-frame transom windows spans the storefront. The middle section of the floor consists of two recessed entrances that flank a large plate-glass window. The left entrance has two wood doors with ten panes of glass while the right entrance has a single wood door with fifteen panes of glass. Each entrance has four wood-frame transom windows above it. The northernmost section of the building also has a storefront with plate-glass windows and a recessed central entrance. A row of wood-frame transom windows also spans the storefront.

The front of the building is spanned by a full-length covered porch that covers the sidewalk. The porch is supported by four square concrete and brick columns and three wrought-iron columns that were added later. A wrought-iron railing encloses the porch's flat roof, creating a balcony for the upstairs rooms.

The second floor of the front façade has several boarded-up window and door openings. Beginning at the uthern end of the façade, the façade has a large window opening followed by a door opening, then three more window openings, a door opening, and finally a single window opening.

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Side/Southwest Facade

The first floor of the southwest façade is fenestrated with two door openings, one with a recessed door near the center of the façade, and one with a metal screen door near the rear of the façade. In addition, the entrance near the rear of the façade is approached by two concrete steps and has metal pipe handrails.

The second floor of the façade is fenestrated by several windows. Beginning at the left end of the façade, there is a single wood-framed, nine-over-one, double-hung window, followed by four pairs of wood-framed, nine-over-one, double-hung windows, followed by a single wood-framed, nine-over-one, double-hung window.

Rear/Northwest Façade

The first floor of the rear façade is comprised of the rear of the storefronts and the hotel lobby. Beginning at the northern end of the façade is a set of double wood doors with five recessed horizontal panels. Above the ors is a row of five wood-frame transom windows. To the south of the doors is a pair of wood-framed, ple-hung, nine-over-nine-over-one windows. Next is a boarded-up opening followed by a door that leads to a covered walkway to the outbuilding followed by another boarded-up opening. The rear of the southern storefront has a set of double wood doors with five recessed horizontal panels flanked on each side by a single wood-frame, double-hung, nine-over-one window.

The second floor of the rear façade is U-shaped in order to provide light to the interior rooms. The rear façade of the second floor, on the northern leg of the "U," is fenestrated by three wood-framed, double-hung, nine-over-one windows. The interior of the "U" is fenestrated by four pairs of wood-framed, nine-over-one, double-hung windows on the northeast and southwest sides, and a pair of wood-framed, nine-over-one, double-hung windows on the northwest side. The southern leg of the "U" has a central exit that leads to a wrought iron fire escape (manufactured by the Chickasaw Iron Works of Memphis, Tennessee) that is flanked on each side by a wood-framed, nine-over-one, double-hung window.

Side/Northeast Façade

The first floor of the northeast façade, beginning at the east end, has a boarded-up door followed by two single boarded-up windows. A doorway follows that is sheltered by a gable-roofed awning supported by knee braces. Proceeding across the façade are two boarded-up windows followed by another entrance sheltered by a gable-roofed awning supported by knee braces. Finally, a wood-framed, triple-hung, nine-over-nine-over-one window is located at the northwest corner.

The second floor of the façade, like the southwest façade, is fenestrated by several windows. Beginning at left end of the façade, there is a single wood-framed, nine-over-one, double-hung window, followed by four pairs of wood-framed, nine-over-one, double-hung windows, followed by a single wood-framed, nine-over-one, double-hung window.

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Outbuilding

Located to the northwest of the hotel building is a small outbuilding. It is constructed out of concrete block with a gable roof covered in asphalt shingles. A door is located on the southeast façade and windows are located on the northeast and southwest façades.

Integrity

Overall, the Castleberry Hotel has good integrity. Although some of the windows and doors are boarded up, the size of the openings has been preserved and it is likely that the windows are still present behind the boards. The vast majority of the original windows and doors exist reflecting the workmanship and materials from the time that the building was built. De Valls Bluff has remained a small town and Main Street is still U.S. 70, as it would have been when travels would have stopped at the hotel during the 1920s through the 1950s.

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SUMMARY

Located on U.S. 70 (Main Street) in the small town of De Valls Bluff, the Castleberry Hotel was built in 1925 utilizing the popular Craftsman style of architecture, which is exhibited in the masonry porch piers, wide eaves, and exposed rafter tails. As the best commercial example of the Craftsman style in De Valls Bluff, the Castleberry Hotel is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance under Criterion C. In addition, the Castleberry Hotel is being nominated to the National Register under Criterion A with local significance for its associations with the development of commerce in De Valls Bluff after the arrival of U.S. 70 in the early 1920s.

ELABORATION

Settlement began in Prairie County in the early part of the nineteenth century with the arrival of two men named Watts and East who settled near the current location of Des Arc. By the mid-nineteenth century settlement began in the area of De Valls Bluff with the arrival of C. S. De Vall from Georgia and Captain Patrick H. Wheat. In 1846, there were enough people in the area to warrant the creation of Prairie County by act of the legislature on November 25. Initially, Prairie County included nearly all of the land that encompasses Lonoke County, but it was separated off in 1873.

De Valls Bluff, which was named after C. S. De Vall, was a small community at the beginning of the Civil War, containing a "store and dwelling house and a 'boat landing." However, in 1863, the community was taken by Federal troops and made their supply base for Little Rock and other points to the west. When the White River was navigable, supplies were shipped to De Valls Bluff and then shipped to Little Rock on the railroad.²

After the Union troops took possession of De Valls Bluff, the town was inundated with refugees seeking protection. Houses were built for them and as a result, by the end of the war, De Valls Bluff's population had increased significantly. Although many of the refugees went back to their original homes at the end of the war, it remained an important community. In 1873, it was designated the county seat for Prairie County's Southern District, and by the 1880s it had "a postoffice [sic.], two general, two drug, three grocery and one millinery store, a livery stable, two hotels, a boat oar factory, a large saw-mill, a Methodist Church, white, and a Baptist Church, colored, a school-house each for the whites and blacks, two title abstract offices, a lodge each of Masons, Knights of Pythias, Knights of Honor, Good Templars and Iron Hall."

As a road system developed across Arkansas in the beginning of the twentieth century, De Valls Bluff ended up on the road designated Highway A-1, which connected Little Rock with Memphis to the east and Fort

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Smith to the west. The importance of the highway was also noted when the U.S. highway system was created in 1925, and it received the designation U.S. 70.4

As in the nineteenth century, it was important to provide goods and services to travelers on U.S. 70 as it passed through De Valls Bluff, especially since the highway followed Main Street. In 1925, the Castleberry Hotel was constructed to provide services to travelers. (It actually replaced another hotel and movie theatre that were on the site.) The building had the public spaces (lobby and restaurant) on the first floor and 24 rooms on the top floor. The hotel, which was built in the Craftsman style, also exhibited the latest in architectural style.⁵

After the Castleberry Hotel opened, it apparently became *the* place to stay in De Valls Bluff. Although two other hotels appear on the April 1924 Sanborn map, a Colored Hotel on Williams Street east of Main Street, and the Central Hotel on Brinkley Street east of Main Street, both had gone out of business by 1950. The astleberry Hotel's location on Main Street, conveniently across the street from an auto repair shop and ling station and next door to another restaurant, meant that it was highly visible to travelers passing through.⁶

By 1950, the hotel had changed names and was called the Rogers Hotel. Although it is not known when the hotel closed, the construction of I-40 in the area in the 1960s took much of the through traffic, and its associated business, off of U.S. 70, likely causing the hotel to close. Today, the building is vacant, but the city is hoping to preserve the building so that it can once again become a vital part of De Valls Bluff's downtown.

Prior to the arrival of the Interstate Highway System, locally-run hotels such as the Castleberry Hotel were the lifeblood of many communities on U.S. and state highways. However, today many have closed and some have been lost to deterioration or demolition. The Castleberry Hotel, on the other hand, is a living reminder of the facilities that served travelers in the early and mid twentieth century. In addition, the Castleberry Hotel remains an excellent example of the Craftsman style in De Valls Bluff.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Located on U.S. 70 (Main Street) in the small town of De Valls Bluff, the Castleberry Hotel was built in 1925 utilizing the popular Craftsman style of architecture, which is exhibited in the masonry porch piers, wide eaves, and exposed rafter tails. As the best commercial example of the Craftsman style in De Valls
