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Summary

Distinguished by the use of a variety of sheathing materials, the Matthews-Bryan House is yet another of Edgemont's variations on the English Revival style. A steeply-pitched cross gable and broad chimney dominate the house's main facade, which has changed little since the residence was constructed in 1930.

Elaboration

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One of the three houses erected on Dooley Road before the Depression, the Matthews-Bryan House faces north an a site originally comprised of a lot and a half. The one-and one-half-story house has a steeply-pitched, side-gabled roof with a front-facing cross gable. Veneered with stone, the cross gable contains the house's main entrance, which is flanked by small, multi-paned windows. Directly above the entrance, a small round window is centered in the gable.

Adjacent to the east side of the cross gable; a broad chimney rises above the ridge of the main roof. The chimney is stone-veneered from the foundation through the eave line, where the stone gives way to brick. The same mixture of materials is found elsewhere on the main (north) facade. Stone veneer is used on the cross gable and the portion of the facade to its east; the section of the facade west of the cross gable is brick-veneered. The east and west ends of the house are veneered accordingly: stone on the east end; brick on the west end. The rear (south) facade of the house is veneered with brick.

Two hip-roofed dormers are located in the north face of the main roofline. The walls of the dormers are stuccoed, as are the walls of three dormers located in the main roof's rear (south) face. Each of the rear dormers is different: the one farthest to the east has a hipped roof like the dormers on the north side of the house; the center dormer has a gabled "saltbox" profile, with weatherboards covering the gable end; and the west dormer has a shed roof. The gable end of a one-story ell that projects sough at right angles to the rear facade also is sheathed by weatherboards.

All of the house's original windows either are multi-paned casements or have six-over-six, double-hung sashes. Shortly after buying the house in 1959, the present owners had panes of fixed glass installed to enclose a porch located at the east end of the house. This porch enclosure is the only significant alteration that has been made to the house.

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The original hip-roofed, brick-veneered garage and maid's quarters still stands at the rear of the property, where it is connected to the southwest corner of the house by a brick archway. Although it has been converted to use as a home office/workshop, the garage generally retains its original exterior form.

Inside, the Matthews-Bryan House shares two characteristics in common with many of its pre-Depression Edgemont neighbors: the liberal use of arches and rough-textured plaster walls. Of particular note is the barrel-vaulted hallway that runs from a sunroom at the east end of the house to the kitchen at the west end. Also of interest is a vintage circular shower stall, its original black and white tile intact, located in the first-floor bathroom.

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Summary Criteria A and C, local significance

One of the last houses built in the Edgemont section of Park Hill before construction was halted by the Depression, the Matthews-Bryan House--like most of its neighbors--has a history that speaks of the effects of the Depression. The house is of significance architecturally largely because of its unusual English Revival-style design, which utilizes several different wall materials.

Elaboration

Built speculatively in 1930 by the Justin Matthews Company, the Matthews-Bryan House was sold in August of that year to Henry G. Clok and his wife, Dixie, for \$12,950. The Cloks made only a \$100 cash payment and financed the balance with two mortgages one for \$8,000 to Prudential Insurance Company and a second for \$4,850 to Metropolitan Trust Company. The sale to the Cloks was short-lived; the transaction was canceled in May of 1931, after the Cloks had been able to make only one of their mortgage payments.

Following a pattern typical in Edgemont, the house then was occupied by renters until 1940, when it was purchased by Stuart L. Bryan, a statistician with the U.S. Agricultural Marketing Service, and his wife, Thelma. Three years later, the Bryans sold the house to Mr. and Mrs. Howard French, who, in turn, sold the house in 1959 to the present owners.

Altered only slightly since its construction in 1930, the Matthews-Bryan House is an unusual example of a popular 1920's architectural style, as well as a reminder of the effects the Depression had on Edgemont's development.
