#### SUMMARY

Located in the Lakewood residential area of North Little Rock, the Lakeshore Drive Bridge is immediately adjacent to the west side of Lake No. 3. It is a rare Arkansas example of a masonry arch bridge and includes unusual design features.

#### **ELABORATION**

The Lakeshore Drive Bridge is a masonry, closed spandrel, deck arch bridge constructed from roughly squared, uncoursed field-stone. The total length of the bridge is 53 feet. Its single elliptical arch spans 20 feet and is 5 feet high. The arch-barrel is perpendicular to the roadway. Square columns are incorporated into the surface of the spandrel wall and extend outward from it. These columns are slightly turned on their axes, creating a beveled appearance. This columned spandrel wall extends upward past the level of the roadway to form a parapet with an uneven top surface. The roadway is currently covered with asphalt over an unidentified fill-material. The east elevation is slightly concave. This bridge is in excellent condition and is currently blocked off to vehicular traffic and is being used for a pedestrian walkway.

#### SUMMARY

Constructed as a privately owned bridge by Mr. Justin Matthews, a successful early 20th century residential developer in central Arkansas, the Lakeshore Drive Bridge is a rare example of a masonry arch bridge. Its unusual features were designed to accommodate the architectural concerns of the landscape within Matthew's Lakewood development and especially to the setting immediately adjacent to Lake No. 3, with its park area and unusual concrete sculptures. The bridge retains additional significance as a structure conceived and designed outside the influence of the Arkansas Highway and Transportation Department and the federal government during a time when the majority of the masonry arch bridges in the state were constructed within their jurisdiction. As such, the Lakeshore Drive Bridge is nominated under Criteria A and C with statewide significance.

#### **ELABORATION**

The Lakeshore Drive Bridge is significant in Arkansas as a masonry, closed spandrel, deck arch bridge constructed during the Arkansas Highway and Transportation Department Era: 1923-1939. It was built as part of the residential Lakewood development area, a project conceived by Mr. Justin Matthews and administered through his Metropolitan Trust Company of North Little Rock, Arkansas. This construction project was begun in the late 1930's at a cost of \$250,000. The exact date of construction of the Lakeshore Drive Bridge is unknown. Matthews' innovative plans called for not only residential areas within the project but also for the construction of several recreational lakes, sculpture, open spaces and parks including Lake No. 3 and its stone bridges (see Edgemere Street Bridge nomination, HAER No. AR-40).

Justin Matthews was a prominent Arkansan, past member of the State Highway Commission and a community leader. It is quite likely that the Metropolitan Trust Company's design architect, Frank Carmean, designed the Lakeshore Drive Bridge (along with the Edgemere Street Bridge HAER No. AR-40 and the Lake No. 1 Bridge, HAER No. 39) in the rustic architectural theme of the Lakewood Development. One of a pair of bridges constructed adjacent to Lake No. 3, the Lakeshore Drive Bridge exhibits significant design details, such as vertical columns incorporated into the spandrel walls. It retains additional significance as one of only eight known masonry bridges of this type in the state.







