DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Tavern, or Jesse Hinderliter<sup>1</sup> House, is a two-story clapboard covered, log structure which was built in the early 19th century on the site which now constitutes part of the Arkansas Territorial Restoration. This building was listed in the Historic American Buildings Survey in 1934. Photographs and measured drawings were made at that time and the authenticity of the structure established. In 1939, the development of the Territorial Restoration was made possible by an Act of the Arkansas Legislature. This Act created a Commission to have charge of the project, and appropriated funds to purchase the original grounds and contribute to the restoration work.

The Tavern - Hinderliter House, is the most significant structure in the Territorial Restoration Complex. Built in the early 19th century, and remodeled in 1834, it is constructed of large, hand-hewn, oak logs and covered with red heart, hand beaded, cypress siding. All the ceiling beams, both upsairs and down, have the same corner-beaded finish. The hand carved mantel in the downstairs West Room is especially interesting. Some of the interior wall boards in the building are eighteen and twenty inches wide. In the upstairs room the wall boards have been left off to show the original log construction of the building.

During the restoration work of 1939-41, the exterior clapboard was replaced; sagging ridgepole, rafters and joists were also replaced at this time. At this time also, some modifications which had taken place over the years were apparently restored to their original condition. Max Mayer (deceased) was the architect in charge of the restoration.<sup>2</sup>

The maintenance of this structure under the Arkansas Territorial Restoration Commission has been excellent.

The Tavern, or Jesse Hinderliter House, is significant in that it is probably the only wooden building surviving from the period prior to Arkansas' achieving statehood. It was in existence during the time that Little Rock was the Territorial Capitol, and it is believed that some Territorial meetings may have taken place in the building; if only on an informal basis. This cannot be documented, nor can it be disproved.

The Territorial Restoration site, on which the Tavern stands, was initially part of a one-half block area which comprised a significant portion of the original townsite of Little Rock. The area extends for a full block facing Cumberland Street to the east, and for a halfblock on Second Street to the north, and Third Street to the south. In addition to the early 19th century Tavern, eleven other structures from the old city have been restored or reconstructed. In depth research and restoration continues on these buildings.

In 1967 the balance of the block was acquired by the State of Arkansas under a Housing and Urban Development "Open Space" matching funds grant. No additional restorations or reconstructions are contemplated for this newly acquired land. It is intended to utilize this area for an extension of the attractive landscaping of the Territorial Restoration grounds, and to provide parking for visitors.

The grounds on which this early 19th century tavern now stands consists of one complete city block in the downtown section of the city of Little Rock.
