

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Marshall Square Historic District is comprised of sixteen architecturally significant buildings. Dating from the early 20th century, few of the district's buildings have undergone major alterations. These sixteen houses were built for rental property and are virtually identical to each other except for minor variations in roof lines or porch placement.

Marshall Square has eight houses facing 17th Street and eight houses facing 18th Street. It retains the scale and density of early 20th Century rental houses. The district is primarily commercial residential in character. Each unit is a Victorian cottage suitable for single-family dwelling.

#### Buildings contributing to the character of the district:

The Marshall Square historic district consists of sixteen frame single-family residences. Each of the sixteen houses for all practical purposes, is identical. The houses have four-inch weatherboard exteriors and high hip roofs. Fish scale siding is present around some of the dormer windows. All of the windows are double-hung with four or eight lights. Six of the houses on 17th Street have 14 colored lights surrounding a larger central light. All houses have a brick chimmey connecting to a flue in the house. All of the houses are one storey mounted on piers. The fronts of the houses have brick foundations. The front porches are about 200 square feet. They have wooden decks and two entrances on the front porch. Each house is 1,036 square feet. The houses have wood floor joist, pine floor, plaster walls and 10 foot ceilings. The plans consist of two bedrooms, living room, dining room, kitchen and bath.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Marshall Square is a well-preserved group of early Twentieth Century row houses. Occupying an entire city block in the city of Little Rock, the sixteen structures present a good example of vernacular architecture. As a group, these houses maintain a strong link to the history of Little Rock through their design and cohesive placement on the block. In spite of a new school being constructed to the north in the block across 17th Street and Interstate-30 across McAlmont Street to the east, Marshall Square retains the ambience and scale of a grouping of early Twentieth Century residences. The block referred to as Marshall Square is bounded on the east by McAlmont Street, by 18th Street on the south, 17th on the north and Vance on the west.

In 1906 Mr. Josephus C. Marshall acquired the property where the sixteen houses are situated. The land was a part of the Bragg Estate which included a large section of the now historic residential area of Little Rock. At the time of Marshall's purchase, the land was considered on the outskirts of the city. Records indicate that J. C. Marshall had completely paid for the property by 1913. In 1917-1918 Marshall constructed the sixteen structures on the block as rental property. Eight of the houses were built facing 17th Street and eight facing 18th Street. The middle portion of the block was open space.

At the time of construction of the houses, the area was strictly residential. Several changes have occurred to the neighborhood since. Interstate-30 is adjacent to the property on the east. On the north, an entire block of homes has been razed. The Arkansas Highway Department is constructing an elementary school on this site. The next block north (15th and 16th Streets) will be the Interstate 30-630 interchange.

Josephus C. Marshall was born in 1856 and died in 1926. He was a prominent lawyer and real-estate developer in Little Rock. Marshall Square remained in the same family until 1978 when the present owners purchased the block.

The uniqueness of Marshall Square lies in the similarity in design and cohesive placement on one block of sixteen houses. Plans are being formulated to develop the block and maintain the early Twentieth Century charm and architectural features of the exteriors. The central area is to be utilized as a green area for use by all residents of the block.
