Summary

The Farmers Bank Building is a single-story, brick masonry commercial building constructed c. 1910 in a vernacular interpretation of the Richardsonian Romanesque style. The building now houses the Serenity Farm Bread bakery, and the interior has been remodeled accordingly. Located at the corner of Main and Walnut Streets in Leslie, the Farmers Bank Building is in good condition with only minor alterations to the exterior.

Elaboration

Constructed c. 1910, the Farmers Bank Building is a single-story, brick masonry commercial building designed in a vernacular interpretation of the Richardsonian Romanesque style of architecture. The building rests upon a cast concrete foundation and is covered by flat roof with a parapet.

The front, or western, elevation is anchored by the bevelled corner bay at the southern end. New double-leaf doors are located underneath the porch, which is supported by a single square brick column. Semi-circular limestone arches connect the column with the two respective walls. The remainder of the front elevation is dominated by two enormous arched windows. Again, the arches (and sills) are constructed of limestone and feature a three-part keystone. The windows are wood-frame and consist of four triangular panes over one. Three threequarter-height brick pilasters separate the windows and the bevelled bay. There are also four horizontal limestone belt courses that lend texture to the facade. The first is formed by the window sills; the next highest is found only on the pilasters and porch column at the height of the middle window sash; another course caps the pilasters; and the last course divides the remaining distance to the roof coping, which also appears to be of limestone.

The longer southern elevation is much more simply arranged and consists of three groups of side-by-side (actually separated slighty) one-over-one wood-frame windows. Although much shorter than conventional one-over-one sashes, these windows still present a dignified appearance through the use of flat limestone crowns and sills. A single-leaf wood door covered by a flat metal roof is located at the eastern end of the elevation.

The interior has recently been remodled in accordance to the new usage of the building as the Serenity Farm Bread bakery. No original detail from the bank or the post office (which moved into the building in the 1930's) remains visible.

Located at the corner of Main and Walnut Streets in Leslie (both streets constitute Ark. Hwy. 66), the Farmers Bank Building exhibits a virtually unaltered exterior and is in good condition.



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
Significance

The Farmers Bank Building was constructed around 1910 to house this small banking institution. It remained in business until some time in the 1930's, when the bank closed and the U. S. Post Office moved their Leslie facility into the building. It now houses a bakery.


The Farmers Bank Building is a relatively high-style institutional building in that it exhibits the strong influence of the Richardsonian Romanesque style; as such it represents the historic context *Searcy County History, 1865-1910: Reconstruction, Railroads and Renewal.* As noted in this context, this was a period of county-wide growth and prosperity, relatively speaking, and thus a period during which there was much new immigration, and so much new construction. The community of Leslie, with its lumber manufacturing and its propitious location on the Missouri and North Arkansas Railroad, looked forward to many years of growth and prosperity. The construction of such downtown commercial buildings speaks to the optimism attendant upon the growth of the various lumbering industries that flourished among the forests of Searcy County during the late nineteenth century, particularly after the realization of the railroad line. The Farmers Bank Building is thus eligible with local significance under Criterion A for its direct association with this period of increased settlement, economic growth and high aspirations for the social and economic future of the county. It is also eligible under Criterion C as the best and most well-preserved example of this relatively high-style commercial design in Leslie during this period.
