
SUMMARY

The Mt. Moriah Masonic Lodge in Lisbon is a two-story wooden building which has remained basically unaltered and on its original site since its construction in 1858. It is an excellent example of the type of structure which was built in the mid-19th century to serve not only as a social and civic meeting place, but also as a location for religious services. The two-story design of the lodge clearly reveals this dual function.

ELABORATION

The two-story, rectangular, gabled-roof structure of the Mt. Moriah Masonic Lodge, approximately $22' \times 55'$, is made of cypress throughout, including the weatherboards. All of the windows are double-hung and those on the ground floor have working shutters. The structure is held together by both wooden pegs and square nails. One of the most unique features of the Mt. Moriah Lodge is the corner posts. Sitting on log sills, each post is a single timber for the full two-story height, measuring $12" \times 12"$ and hewn into an "L" shape. The floor on the first level is also unusual. It is "puncheon-like" in appearance -- that is, all of the floor boards begin and end on the sleepers, producing seams which run the full width of the building. In plan, the first level is a single room with a door at the center of one end and another at the center of one side. The entrance to the stairway is from the outside. The second floor, where the lodge actually meets, has one large room and three smaller divisions, one of which is the enclosed staircase. The other two are a small storage room and a kitchen area. In the large room, there are podiums, or stations, on three sides. Some of the floor boards on the podiums measure 26" across. The station at the end opposite the kitchen and stairs is emphasized by a free-standing elliptical arch structure, supported by square columns. The original wood-burning stove is still present, although no longer in use.

8. Significance



Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

SUMMARY

The Mt. Moriah Masonic Lodge is located in Lisbon, a one-time lumber town, which is now only a small rural community. The 1858 lodge is the only reminder of the original, once vital settlement. The two-story wooden building is on its original site, a lot which it shares with a landmark old oak tree. The lodge is significant because of its construction and basically unaltered condition as well as the role of the Masons and their lodge building in the community. It is an excellent example of the type of structure which was built in the mid-19th century to serve not only as a social and civic meeting place, but also as a location for religious services.

ELABORATION

The Mt. Moriah chapter of the Masonic Lodge was chartered in 1848 and its present meeting place was constructed ten years later, in 1858, by L. O. McKinzie. The construction of the lodge makes it distinctive in Arkansas buildings. The use of a single timber for a two-story corner post is most likely unique in the state. The stairway is also noteworthy because it is completely held together by wooden pegs. Mt. Moriah Lodge played an important role in the community, serving as a community center for over one hundred years. Traditionally, the ground floor of the lodge was made available for any religious organizations which needed a place to meet. Due to the secretive nature of the Masonic organization, knowledge of specific service projects is limited; however, members of the lodge financially support the widows of Masons and their children, including paying for a college education. Not only have members of Mt. Moriah Lodge "been of an upstanding community character", several of its charter members, such as Lewis Murph and D. R. Coulter, were also leaders, holding local political offices as well as being members of the state legislature in the 1850's. The lodge remains virtually unaltered and is still located on its original site. It is the oldest structure in the state which was built by the Masons as a lodge and continues to be used for this purpose.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

Mount Moriah Lodge #18 is located in Section 2, Township 17 south, Range 17 west in Union County Arkansas. Specifically, from the intersection of State Highway 172 and the county road at Lisbon, Arkansas, proceed south along State Highway 172 for 234 feet. Next proceed east for 67 feet to the northwest corner of the property. Then proceed east 60 feet to the northeast corner. Then proceed south 27 feet to the southeast corner. Then proceed west 60 feet to the southwest corner. Then proceed north 27 feet to the point of origin, thus encircling the property.


