Description

During the Railroad Era (1870-1914) in White County a variety of vernacular houses were constructed. They were also built out of a variety of materials. Surviving examples from this period, however, are somewhat limited. The Paschall House is a good example of an I-house with an original rear T. This building is of frame construction with a brick veneer and a gable roof. The roof is clad with both composition shingles and metal. The entire structure rests on a brick foundation.

Located on the northeast corner of N. Oak and E. Center Streets, this building was constructed less than five blocks southeast of the court square in Searcy. The Paschall House was constructed c. 1890 and is in fair condition. It was originally only one-story tall but a second floor was added at a later time as was the brick veneer; the veneer was added sometime between 1896 and 1901. The main, or south, elevation of the structure is dominated by a two-story porch that extends across most of the facade. Its flat roof is supported by wooden columns. A wrought-iron cantilevered balcony is centrally located on the second floor of the building. Fenestration on the main elevation consists of symmetrically placed pairs of one-over-one double-hung wood sash windows. Single centrally placed doors are evident on both floors of the structure. One leads onto the previously mentioned balcony and is relatively simply decorated while the first floor door is adorned with both sidelights and transom. Both floors of the east and west elevations are relieved with single symmetrically placed one-over-one double-hung wood sash windows.

A corbelled brick chimney rises from the gable peak in the center of the main building. A single door exits the northwest portion of the main building. The rear T of the building extends from the north elevation of the structure. Its gable roof is capped with a centrally placed corbelled brick chimney. Two hipped roof dormers project from the eastern slope of its roof. A three-sided bay projects from the west elevation of the rear T. Its two chamfered sides are fenestrated with single one-over-one double-hung wood sash windows. Two similar windows are located just north of the bay.

A gable roof addition is attached to the rear "T"; this addition, however, is not historic. Its west elevation is fenestrated with a symmetrically placed pair of nine-over-six double-hung aluminum sash windows. The north elevation of the addition is relieved by a single asymmetrically placed one-over-one double-hung sash window. A large shed roof addition extends the full length of the east side of the rear additions and connects with the northeast comer of the main building. A single asymmetrically placed door enters the north elevation of this addition while a similar door enters the east elevation of it. The latter door is flanked by paired one-over-one double-hung sash windows.

#### **Significance**

When this building was constructed, c. 1890, it was one of numerous I-houses built in White County during the Railroad Era. Brick I-houses, including those built with frame construction, have always been rather scarce in the county. There are only twenty-four I-houses of various wall materials left in the county and only the Paschall House used brick as a wall material. For this reason the Paschall House is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance.
