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Description

Commercial buildings of the Railroad Era (1870-1914) mirrored current architectural trends. Builders during this period in White County did not construct many high-style buildings; they instead used architectural details from these styles to elaborate their basically vernacular buildings. The Jesse N. Cypert Law Office is no exception to this.

Located at 104 E. Race Street, this building was constructed less than one block nonheast of the courthouse square in Searcy. The building is one-story in height, rectangular in shape and of brick construction. Even though it was constructed c. 1880, it is still in good condition. Its main, or south elevation consists of centrally placed double doors that are flanked by double-pane fixed frame windows. Facade decoration consists of three corbelled brick bays housing the doors and windows. A single metal vent is found in the upper portions of each bay; a simple decorative brick comice caps the structure. The building has a flat roof with parapet. A single centrally placed door accesses the north elevation of the structure. Two symmetrically arranged corbelled brick chimneys are found along the interior wall of the east elevation.



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Significance

Through the years this building has housed not only the law office but also a bus stop, cafe and currently an abstract company. This structure, however, is significant by virtue of the fact that between the years 1880 and 1942 (the end of the historic period) it housed the Cypert Law Firm, and thus remains the historic resource in Searcy most closely associated with both Jesse N. Cypert, the founder of the law firm, and his son Eugene, who carried on his father's professional and political legacy into the twentieth century. The building is also significant for its being the best preserved example in Searcy of a simple, commercial storefront building with impressive panel brick details.

Jesse N. Cypert was born in Wayne County, Tennessee in 1823. He grew up in this county and studied law there. Sometime after 1849, he moved to Georgia before coming to Crittenden County, Arkansas, in 1858. Cypert moved to Searcy in 1861 and opened his law practice as well as being an editor of the town's newspaper. He was also part of a group of attorneys that laid the groundwork for organizing a state bar association. Soon after, however, he joined the Confederate army and rose to the rank of major. After the war he returned to his law practice and continued in it until at least 1890. Between the years of 1880 and 1890 he conducted his practice from within the confines of this building.

In addition, Cypert was very active in local and state politics. Prior to the construction of this building he served in the conventions that both voted to secede from the union and the one that admitted Arkansas back into the union, and in 1874 was in the convention that furnished the state's new, post-Reconstruction constitution. He also served as judge of the First Judicial Circuit and was a member of the Searcy Town Council. Cypert ran for the legislature on the temperance question in 1854 and later in 1882 became the President of the Temperance Alliance. He was also a member of the Masons. Jesse N. Cypert was appointed to the building committee that was responsible for constructing the First United Methodist Church in Searcy (See enclosed nomination for details). From 1883 until 1886 he was also a member of the Searcy School Board.

His only son, Eugene, later became a junior partner of the Cypert Law Firm. Eugene Cypert carried on his fathers tradition with regards to being a prominent citizen of Searcy; his list of accomplishments is almost as long as his father's. Eugene Cypert was appointed in 1909 to be one of the Bridge Commissioners that was ultimately responsible for bridging the Little Red River just north of Searcy. From 1908 until 1912, Cypert served on the Searcy School Board just like his father had previously. In 1927 he served on the committee responsible for

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getting the Arkansas State Highway Commission to build highways through Searcy. Cypert also served on Searcy's centennial committee in 1937 and, prior to this in 1928, was selected as the historian for the Sons of Confederate Veterans.

The Jesse N. Cypert Law Office is also significant by virtue of its standing as the best surviving example of a single-story, panel brick commercial building in the town of Searcy. Though it is essentially a simple, restrained commercial building, the quality of the panel brick detailing on the parapet above the first floor is exceptional. The turning of the brick to form the dentil course just beneath the parapet top; the corbelling of the brick directly above each of the panels; and the corbelling of the brick courses at either end of the panel section to form pendils and other decorative features remains the most ornamental application of this vernacular style locally.

For the above stated reasons the Jesse N. Cypert Law Office is being nominated under both Criterion B and C with local significance.

Verbal Boundary Description:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northern edge of Race Street with a perpendicular line running along the eastern elevation of the building, proceed northerly along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the northern elevation of the building; thence proceed westerly along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the western elevation of the building; thence proceed southerly along said line to a point formed by its intersection with the northern edge of Race Street; thence proceed easterly to the point of beginning.
