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Significance

The buildings of the Morris Hartsell Farmstead survive as the finest extant examples of early construction techniques within a single White County farmstead. The initial single log pen with its impressive stone chimney, followed by such typical "improvements" as the addition of a frame pen and weatherboarding throughout, is complemented by the huge braced frame, mortise and tenon barn which clearly dates to the 1880's and probably earlier. The unfortunate advanced state of deterioration of the barn actually aids the viewer in appreciating the quality of the construction and the expansiveness of the frame itself. All the included buildings are particularly good examples of the craftsmanship and skill of the earlier farmers who committed themselves to agrarian pursuits in the county.

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Description

The Morris Hartsell Farmstead consists of a main residence, a small equipment/storage shed, and a large, braced frame livestock/feed barn. It includes most of its original property: 31.94 acres, or the southeastern quarter of the southwestern quarter of Section 6, Township 9 North, Range 6 West, less approximately eight acres, which has been subdivided in the recent past.

The house is a single story, gable roof, double-pen residence, with the earlier, eastern pen constructed of hewn logs (half dovetail notching) and the later western pen of wood frame construction. The rear ell and the rooms behind the later pen also date from the c. 1880 remodeling of the original log pen. The only chimney is the original massive, stone exterior end chimney which adorns the eastern gable end of the house. The house is covered with a metal roof, sheathed with weatherboard, and supported upon stone piers.

The southern or front elevation is fundamentally symmetrical, with the two single-leaf entrances each flanked by two four-over-four wood sash windows. The windows in the newer, western pen, however, are placed slightly higher than those in the older, eastern pen. A continuous, single story, full-length shed roof porch shelters the entire elevation and is supported on solid wood posts. The northern elevation is fenestrated only by a central fourover-four wood sash window in the gable end of the ell and a square fixed wood window in the rear elevation of the attached shed to the west.

The eastern elevation features the massive stone chimney rising through the gable peak, flanked on either side by a square window opening (now filled). The rear ell is lighted by two four-over-four wood sash windows flanking a central single-leaf entry. The western elevation is lighted by a single central four-over-four wood sash window in the first floor of the gable end and two more identical windows flanking another single-leaf entry in the ell. The shed addition on the northern side of the gable end is blank.

The building has remained substantially unchanged since the 1880 expansion. A shed roof porch which projected from the eastern elevation of the rear ell has deteriorated and subsequently been removed.

The single story equipment/storage shed, located directly to the north (rear) of the house, is covered by a metal gable roof with attached side sheds. Though originally sheathed with board-and-batten, it is now covered with weatherboards. It is of wood frame construction and rests upon stone piers. It is relieved by three front entries and the eastern shed is open on that side.

The livestock/feed barn is a full two-and-one-half stories in height, covered with a metal gable roof with a ridgepole, and of mortise-and-tenon, braced frame construction. All interior fittings have been removed, leaving only the original structure itself, though it appears to have been a transverse crib plan. The exterior is sheathed in vertical boards and the structure rests upon stone piers. A hay hook remains attached to the ridgepole.

Verbal Boundary Description:

Beginning at the northeast corner of the intersection of State Highway 157 and County Road 513, proceed northerly along the eastern edge of State Highway 157 to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the southern elevation of the adjacent modern building (not included); thence proceed easterly along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the southeast corner of the adjacent modern building to the north (not included); thence proceed northerly along said line for a distance of 1,000 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to State Highway 157 to the south; thence proceed easterly along said line for a distance of 1,062 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to State Highway 157 to the west; thence proceed southerly along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the northern elevation of the adjacent modern storage buildings (not included); thence proceed westerly along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the western elevation of the westernmost modern storage building; thence proceed southerly along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the southern elevation of the storage building; thence proceed easterly along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the western elevation of the modern facility (not included); thence proceed southerly along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the northern edge of State Highway 157; thence proceed westerly along said line to the point of beginning.

Boundary Justification:

This boundary includes all the property historically associated with this resource that retains its integrity.
