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Description

During the Boom and Bust Era (1914-1939) in White County a variety of vernacular houses were constructed. They were also built out of a variety of materials. Surviving examples from this period, however, are somewhat limited. The Sam Ray House is a rare example of a double-pile house built according to the Creole tradition. This one-story building is of frame construction and clad with novelty siding. The hipped roof is covered with sheet metal and the entire structure rests on stone piers.

Located on the east side of State Road 305 and approximately one-quarter of a mile northeast of County Road 47, this building was constructed near the crossroad community of Clay. The Sam Ray House was constructed c. 1915 and although it is unoccupied, it is still in good condition and unaltered. Its main, or north elevation is dominated by a recessed porch that extends across the entire front of the structure and extends along the entire west side. The roof of this porch is supported by simple wooden box columns. Two single symmetrically placed doors access this porch on both its north and west elevations. Symmetrically arranged four-over-one double-hung wood sash windows are located on the north elevation of the house while similar asymmetrically placed windows reside on the other three sides of the house. Brick chimneys rise from both the eastern and western slopes of the hipped roof. A recessed porch is located on the southeast corner of the building. The roof of this porch is supported by simple wooden box columns and the porch itself is accessed by two single doors.

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Significance

When this building was constructed, c. 1915, it was one of hundreds of double-pile buildings built during the Boom and Bust Era (1914-1939). Although there are two hundred and twenty four of these structures extant in the county, this is the only one built according to a Creole floor plan. Because of this, the Sam Ray House is significant for its contribution to the study of vernacular architecture and is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance.



Verbal Boundary Description:

Beginning at the point formed by the intersection of a line running along the southern edge of State Highway 305 with a perpendicular line running parallel to the western elevation of the building and located 50 feet to the west thereof, proceed southerly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to the point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the southern elevation of the building; thence proceed easterly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the eastern elevation of the building; thence proceed northerly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the southern edge of State Highway 305; thence proceed westerly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to the point of beginning.

Boundary Justification:

The original lot has been subdivided during the non-historic period, resulting in an indefinite current lot boundary; therefore, this boundary includes all the property historically associated with this resource that retains its integrity.











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
