## Description

During the Railroad Era (1870-1914) in White County a variety of vemacular houses were constructed. They were also built out of a variety of materials. Surviving examples from this period, however, are somewhat limited. The Rufus Gray House is a good example of a one and one-half story, frame, irregularly shaped building. The hip roof slopes downward and terminates with gable wings; the entire roof is covered with composition shingles. The walls are still clad with novelty siding and the entire structure rests on brick piers.

Located on the southeast comer of Austin and South Streets, this building was constructed within the Pangburn city limits. It was constructed in 1912, and is still in good condition. The main, or west, elevation of the structure is dominated by a shed roof porch that extends from the gable wing westward to the end of the building. The roof is supported by Doric columns. Fenestration consists of symmetrically placed single or paired one-over-one double-hung wood sash windows. The upper portion of the gable end is adomed with a circular single-pane fixed frame window that is surrounded by fishscale shaped wood shingles. Gable retums are also evident. The last notable feature on this elevation is gable roof dormer fenestrated with a single one-over-one double-hung wood sash window. The south elevation of the house is fenestrated with single symmetrically placed one-over-one doublehung wood sash windows.

Gable retums and fishscale detailing are visible in the gable end. A shed roof porch, supported by Doric columns, originally stretched from the gable wing on the east elevation of the structure almost to the southern terminus of the building. This porch, however, is now screened in and enclosed; the columns are still visible. Fenestration consists of a small two-over-two double-hung sash window in the enclosed portion of the porch and an original one-over-one double-hung wood sash window in the gable end. This gable end features the same details found on the building's other gable ends. The north elevation of the structure features a gable wing with chamfered comers. The three bays of this wing are fenestrated with single one-over-one double-hung wood sash windows. Once again the gable end detailing is consistent with the rest of the building. A symmetrically placed one-over-one doublehung wood sash window and a single door are also found on this elevation. One corbelled brick, as well as one plain brick, chimney rises from the interior of the structure.

## Significance

When this house was constructed in 1912, it was one of numerous imegularly-shaped buildings built during the Railroad Era (1870-1914). Even though there are sixty-six of these buildings still left in the county very few exhibit the amount of integrity found in the Rufus Gray House. For this reason it is being nominated under Criterion $C$ with local significance.
