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#### Description

During the Railroad Era (1870-1914) in White County a variety of vernacular houses were constructed. They were also built out of a variety of materials. Surviving examples from this period, however, are somewhat limited. The Avanell Wright House is a good example of a one-story, frame irregularly shaped building. The pyramid roof slopes downward and terminates with gable wings; the entire roof is covered with composition shingles. The walls are still clad with novelty siding and the entire structure rests on a stone foundation.

Located on the northeast corner of Main and Pine Streets, this building was constructed within the Pangburn city limits. It was constructed c. 1910, and is still in good condition. The main, or south, elevation of the structure is dominated by a one-story porch that wraps-around to the west elevation of the house. Its shed roof is supported by Doric columns. There are three entrances onto the porch, one at each end of the porch and one on the chamfered corner of the main building. Fenestration on this elevation consists of symmetrically placed one-over-one double-hung sash windows. All of the upper portions of the gable ends, even on the projecting bays, are fenestrated with single-pane fixed frame windows. The lower portions of the gable ends that stem from the pyramid roof are fenestrated with a large centrally placed one-over-one double-hung sash window that is flanked by similar, yet smaller, windows.

Projecting gable roof bays are located on the north and east elevations of the structure. Both originally housed a paired one-over-one double-hung sash window; the one on the north elevation, however, has been replaced by a smaller paired three-over-one double-hung sash window. A recessed porch was originally located on the northeast corner of the house but it has since been enclosed. This room is entered on its north side by a single asymmetrically placed door and fenestrated with single-pane fixed frame windows. A one-story gable roof addition is attached to the northwest corner of the original building. Because the walls of this addition are clad with cut stone and there are exposed rafters at the roofline it is believed that this room was probably added in the 1930's. It is entered by a single door on its west elevation while the only window is located on the north elevation. This window is a one-over-one double-hung sash window. There are two brick chimneys that rise from the interior of the original building.



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#### **Significance**

When this house was constructed, c. 1910, it was one of numerous irregularly-shaped buildings built during the Railroad Era (1870-1914). Even though there are sixty-six of these buildings still left in the county very few exhibit the amount of integrity found in the Wright House. For this reason it is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance.
