The Feed Storage Shed at the Arthur Williams Homestead is a one-and-one-half story, box and wood frame construction feed storage building. Its plan is rectangular. The original box section is double-pen, and the two flanking shed roof sections were added later. A single brick firebox stands in the center of the building against an interior wall, though it has been capped and covered by the roof. The building now stands upon concrete block piers, is sheathed with both board-and-batten and vertical planks and is covered with a metal gable roof.

Its eastern or front elevation features a cantilevered, gable porch roof above a recessed wall relieved only by a single-leaf entry to the north. Two open, shed roof, wood frame sheds flank the gable roof section. The western elevation is blank with the exception of a single-leaf door in the back of the gable roof section and another identical door in the back of the southern shed. The northern and southern elevations are blank.

The interior of the central, gable roof section reveals its original construction. Two long sills extend to the east and west, while two shorter girts are notched at the ends and laid over the sills. One of the girts is laid over the ends of the sills while the other is placed several feet back from the opposite end of the sills so as to allow the ends to project. A cantilevered, gable roof porch projects out over these projecting pieces and is supported upon them. The vertical planks are then nailed into this combination sill construction and into the plate above, upon which the roof is supported. Small, wood sliding windows provide the fenestration into the box construction section.

Significance

Criterion C, local significance

The Feed Storage Shed at the Arthur Williams Homestead is significant from this era of White County history (Boom and Bust: The War and Depression Years, 1914-1939; Section E,4) by virtue of its construction. Though it was originally a residence and was converted c. 1930 into a feed storage building (at which time the sheds were added), it retains the integrity of the construction technique for which it is being nominated. Simple box construction -- consisting of a rectangular or square sill and plate configuration connected by vertical planks that carry the load of the roof without other framing of any kind -- is common in White County; this particular sub-type, however, is not. The use of side-gable sills that are longer than the end-gable sills for the purpose of providing the structural support for an integral, cantilevered porch roof, all the while relying on the vertical planks structurally, is a sub-type of box construction not often seen throughout the state, and certainly not in White County. Thus, in spite of the addition of the wood frame side sheds, the Feed Storage Shed at the Arthur Williams Homestead remains significant as an intact example of this unusual construction technique.

Beginning at a point located about 50 feet to the northeast of the northeast corner of the shed (located approximately 1490 feet south of State Highway 87 and 800 feet west of Falwell Street), proceed westerly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the shed's western elevation; thence proceed southerly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the shed's western elevation; thence proceed easterly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the shed's southern elevation; thence proceed easterly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the shed's eastern elevation; thence proceed northerly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the shed's eastern elevation; thence proceed northerly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the shed's eastern elevation; thence proceed northerly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to the point of beginning.

Boundary Justification:

This resource was constructed as part of a larger farmstead that has lost its integrity as such; thus, this boundary includes all the property known to be historically associated with this resource.
