SUMMARY:

Bradford City Hall/Byers Masonic Hall is a two-story, Craftsman style structure faced on the first floor with fieldstone and on the second with stucco. It features a gable roof and a small jail addition on the rear elevation.

ELABORATION:

Bradford City Hall/Byers Masonic Hall is a two-story, Craftsman style structure faced on the first floor with fieldstone and on the second with stucco. It features a gable roof and a small jail addition on the rear elevation.

The front, or south elevation features four evenly spaced double-hung six over six windows on both the upper and lower floors. A wooden door with a fixed six-pane windows is located in the center of the first floor. A second door enters the building at the western end of the south elevation. Both doors are protected by simple flat roofs supported by wires anchored to the second story of the building.

The west elevation is featureless except for a louvered grate in the gable end.

The rear, or north elevation features four evenly spaced double-hung six-over-six windows on the second floor. The western end of the first floor protrudes with a small, shed-roofed, fieldstone-faced jail cell, which is devoid of windows. Two double-hung, six-over-six windows fenestrate the eastern end of the north elevation.

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The east elevation features a louvered vent at the gable end of the second floor, and a pair of double-hung, six-over-six windows on the first floor flanking twin wooden doors with stationary six-over-six windows in each. A flat roof protects the doors; it is supported by wires affixed to the second floor façade.

The roof is covered with asphalt singles, and exposed rafter tails grace the eaves of the north and south elevation, giving the building its characteristic Craftsman-style appearance..

The interior of the lower floor has been divided into several rooms. All but the jail cells have pressed tin ceilings and concrete floors. The upper floor interior is all wood including the ceilings, walls, and floors. There is a vent on each end of the building. Although there have been several minor changes, the building essentially has retained its original form.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and period of significance noted above:

In 1934, when the Bradford City Hall/Byers Masonic Lodge was built, Bradford had been in existence for 41 years. The original community was located in an area northeast of its present site, at Old Glaise. Old Glaise was a major shipping point on the White River.

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Byers Lodge was chartered November 9,1854 and functioned for 25 years in Grand Glaise. The lodge met in the upper floor of the Cox, Byers & Co. with most of Grand Glaise was destroyed by fire.

In the mid to late 1800's, the Cairo and Fulton Railroad was constructed, running from Little Rock to Newport. The trains were faster and cheaper than shipping by boat. Shippers began using the railroad. The Bradford Allen Station was built 17 miles southwest of Newport in 1871. Bradford became a major shipping point. Strawberries, grapes, cotton, mussel shells, lumber and pecans were shipped from Bradford regularly.

In the late 1800's, people began moving into the area surrounding Bradford Allen Station. The government was giving away land, in an effort to populate and

cultivate the western threshold, bringing

Many settlers to this are. Their main income came from logging and farming.

On March 9, 1875, the general charter for the municipal corporation of the town of Bradford was approved. It was 18 more years before Bradford would be

incorporated into a township by the White County Court.

In 1879, Byers Lodge and the Baptist built a church building and shared the building. A few years later, the Baptist sold to the School District, which occupied the lower floor, until 1899, at which time, the School District sold to the Methodist. In 1904, the joint tenants built a new frame building. After WWI, the Methodist sold to the American Legion. On March 29, 1930, Byers Lodge was lost to a fire.

In 1934, Byers Lodge and the City of Bradford joined resources and built a new building, with a total cost of \$1574.00. The lower floor would be occupied as he City Hall and the upper floor as the meeting place for Byers Lodge. In 1960, Byers Lodge built a new concrete block building. City Hall moved to a new building in 1995. During the years, this building has been a meeting place for the Boy Scouts and other organizations.

The Bradford City Hall/Byers Masonic Lodge is being nominated to the National Register with local significance under Criterion C as the best and most significant example of a Craftsman-style municipal building extant in the city of Bradford.




