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### National Register of Historic Places Continuation Sheet

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#### Description

The Tobe Hoofman Farmstead consists of a wood frame residence, a well house, a barn and a storm cellar. All of these buildings stand on the forty acres of land (more or less) -- the southeast quarter of the northeast quarter of Section 17, Township 8 North, Range 6 West -- which Tobe Hoofman purchased c. 1910 when he settled this land.

The house is a one-and-one-half story, wood frame, gable roof residential structure with certain vernacular details. Its plan consists of a double-pen front section with a rear ell attached toward the northern gable end of the front section. An single-story enclosed shed runs most of the length of the northern elevation and an open porch supported on simple wood posts runs along both the southern elevation of the ell and the western elevation of the double-pen section. Two interior brick chimneys rise through the roof; one from the center of the double-pen section and another from the center of the rear ell. The house is covered with a composition shingle roof, sheathed with weatherboard, and supported upon brick piers.

The eastern or front elevation is composed of a central pedimented roof dormer above the hipped roof, full-length porch. The porch roof is decorated with a pair of blank pediments, each placed directly over the two single-leaf entrances beneath. The elevation is fenestrated with a pair of one-over-one wood sash windows in the dormer above and two identical wood sash windows flanking the two entrances below. The porch is supported on simple wood Doric columns, which in turn rest upon a plank deck. The western elevation opposite is fenestrated with a window opening in the rear of the northern shed (now covered with sheet metal), a single central two-over-two wood sash window in the gable end of the rear ell, and an entry in the rear wall (southern pen) of the double-pen section.

The northern elevation is lighted by two one-over-one wood sash windows in the center of the gable end, one above the other. The enclosed shed features a single fixed sash window in its later, eastern section, and to the west, an entry flanked by a fixed sash window and a one-over-one wood sash window. The southern elevation is lighted with two pair of one-over-one wood sash windows in the center of gable end of the double-pen section, one pair to each floor. The wall of the rear ell is relieved only by two symmetrically placed single-leaf entries.

The well house is a simple, wood frame structure, with a hipped roof extending from above the small enclosure to cover the well. The roof is supported by two solid wood posts. It is sheathed in weatherboard and covered with composition shingles.

The barn is a gable roof, wood frame building also, and of transverse crib plan. The side of the first floor to the north of the central drive is divided into three cribs and the side to the south is one continuous crib. The second floor is used for hay storage, to which the triangular hay hood attests.

The storm cellar is primarily an underground earthen structure, though the entrance projects above ground and features a shed roof and single-leaf entry. It is covered with composition shingles.

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#### Significance

The Tobe Hoofman Farmstead survives on its original property as a relatively intact example of a modest, early twentieth century rural farmstead during the period when the relatively prosperous national economy and the positive local effect of the railroads combined to make White County a place which was attractive to those from further east who desired to own property and practice farming. The relatively large yet simple barn sheltered the Hoofman livestock, the well house provided the family water (and probably refrigeration also), and the storm cellar provided protection from the tornadoes which have been known to frequent White County. Though Tobe Hoofman probably sold some of his farm products, this farmstead's greatest significance derives from its being an intact example of a smaller farmstead more oriented toward subsistence than commercial enterprise.

#### Verbal Boundary Description:

Beginning at the point formed by the intersection of a line running parallel to the southern elevation of the associated barn and located 50 feet to the south thereof with a perpendicular line running along the western edge of County Road 67 (located 2,675 feet north of the intersection of the western edge of County Road 67 with the northern edge of State Highway 157), proceed northerly along said line for a distance of 1,370 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel with the northern elevation of the associated barn; thence proceed westerly along said line for a distance of 1,250 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel with the western edge of County Road 67; thence proceed southerly along said line for a distance of 1,370 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the southern elevation of the associated barn; thence proceed easterly along said line for a distance of 1,250 feet to the point of beginning.

#### Boundary Justification:

This boundary includes all the property historically associated with this resource that retains its integrity.
