During the Railroad Era (1870-1914) in White County a variety of vernacular houses were constructed. They were also built out of a variety of materials. Intact surviving examples from this period, however, are somewhat limited. The Joe Emmer House is a good example of a one-story, single-pen log building. It has a corrugated metal gable roof and the entire structure rests on stone piers. The building was constructed c. 1890, and has had several historic alterations. It is currently unoccupied and in fair condition.

Located on the north side of County Road 47 and one and three-quarter miles west of the small crossroads community of Holly Springs, this building is located in a very rural area. The log walls on the north and south elevations of the house consist of hand-hewn logs which are 17'10" long. They are connected to similar logs on the east and west elevations by half dovetail notching. The logs on these elevations, however, are only 17'6" long. All logs are four and a half inches wide and six and a half inches tall. A box construction addition is attached to the west elevation of the structure. This addition is covered with board and batten siding. Both gable ends of the building, however, are covered with weatherboard. A centrally placed board and batten door enters the main, or south, elevation of the building. This door, like the others in the building, is constructed with square nails. A single window is located east of this but all glazing has been removed.

Extending the entire length of the building, including the addition, is a shed roofed porch which is supported by wooden posts. The south elevation of the addition is also entered by a centrally placed board and batten door. An exterior end chimney was originally located on the east elevation of the log structure but has since been removed. A board and batten, shed roofed addition extends the length of the north elevation of the log building. There was a sliding window originally centrally placed in this addition but all glazing has been removed from it. The shed roof of this addition extends across the north elevation of the box addition forming a porch roof. A centrally placed sliding window relieves the west elevation of the box addition. 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Significance

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When this building was constructed (c. 1890) it was one of numerous single-pen, log buildings built in White County during the Railroad Era. Even though this house has had several alterations, it is one of only thirty-one single-pen log buildings left in the county which date to this period. The additions themselves are important because they are indicative of construction techniques used during this period in largely rural areas. For these reasons this building is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance.

Verbal Boundary Description:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northeastern edge of County Road 47 with a perpendicular line running parallel to the southeastern elevation of the house and located 50 feet to the southeast thereof, proceed northeasterly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the northeastern elevation of the building; thence proceed northwesterly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the northeastern elevation of the house; thence proceed northwesterly for a distance of approximately 200 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the northwestern elevation of the house; thence proceed southwesterly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the northeastern edge of County Road 47; thence proceed southeasterly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to the point of beginning.

Boundary Justification:

The original lot has been subdivided during the non-historic period, resulting in an indefinite current lot boundary; therefore, this boundary includes all the property historically associated with this resource that retains its integrity.
