The Springhouse at the Col. John Critz Farm is a single story, stone masonry springhouse. Its plan is rectangular. Its cut stone and fieldstone walls are supported by a continuous stone foundation and covered by a wood shingle gable roof.

The western third of the building is latticed on three sides, with stone corner posts, and entered via a central lattice door. The eastern two-thirds is constructed of cut stone and fieldstone and relieved only on the eastern elevation with a central rectangular vent placed in the gable pediment. The coursing of the stone is of interest, as the cut stones and the fieldstones have been laid in discreet courses and not mixed; the result is a very orderly banding effect that continues around all three walls.

The western third of the building shelters the well; the eastern section contains the springhouse (which provided the farm with its refrigeration) into the rear of which runs an open spring. The plates that carry the roof rafters are hand-hewn, as are the joists that connect the plates.

Significance

Criterion C, local significance

The Springhouse at the Col. John Critz Farm is significant by virtue of its status as the earliest stone springhouse surviving in the county from this era of White County history (Development Era in White County; Section E,2) with this level of integrity. It is also significant by virtue of its unusual combination of large, finished cut stones with random fieldstones to form the stone walls, a technique reminiscent of Colonial masonry construction; as such, it is unlike any other surviving masonry structure in the county. It is in good condition.

Verbal Boundary Description:

Beginning at the point formed by the intersection of a line running parallel to the northeastern elevation of the springhouse and located 50 feet to the northeast thereof with a perpendicular line running parallel to the northwestern elevation (located 25 feet south of the southern edge of County Road 818 and 4,550 feet west of Bench Mark #302); proceed southwesterly along the latter line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the southwestern elevation of the springhouse; thence proceed southeasterly for a distance of approximately 200 feet along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the southeastern elevation; thence proceed northeasterly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the northeastern elevation; thence proceed northwesterly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to the point of beginning.

Boundary Justification:

This boundary includes all the property historically associated with this resource that retains its integrity.
