#### Description

The Shue House is a single story, wood frame Craftsman residence. Its cross-gable roof belies the rectangular plan. A large brick exterior chimney is attached to the western elevation. The roof is covered with composition shingles, the walls are clad in brick, and the continuous foundation is constructed of brick also.

The western or front elevation features a recessed porch beneath the southwest corner of the gable roof, supported upon a single corner brick pier and which shelters an entrance in its northern wall. The structural porch sill beneath the cornice is decorated with a panelled friezeboard. The gable wall dormer is stuccoed and decorated with wood knee braces, and the flanking cornice is punctuated with exposed rafters. The wall to the north is lighted with an eight-over-one wood sash window, as are the northern and southern elevations which are otherwise relatively plain. The eastern elevation features a projecting carport with an enclosed rear (southern) room. The wall is punctuated by two single-door entries which are placed symmetrically within the wall. The gable roof over the house and its intersecting wall dormers all meet at a common point in the middle of the roof and are of the same height, and all elevations are decorated with knee braces and exposed rafters.

The Shue House is relatively unaltered with the exception of the rear carport and the replacement of an original central, stepped western chimney with an asymmetrical off-center chimney to the north. It is in good condition.

Significance Criterion C, local significance

The Shue House (Part E, Historic Context #4) is the best example in Beebe of a single story, wood frame and brick Craftsman residence. It was built in 1935 by Edward Shue, who was the owner of the Mobil Oil Company in Beebe. At that time this neighborhood was known as Chumney Heights.

This house is typical of the third period in the evolution of Craftsman style designs in White County. Its floor plan has become very regular and symmetrical and features only the vestiges of the irregularity of plan and elevation which was one of the hallmark features of this building style.
