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Description

During the Boom and Bust Era (1914-1939) in White County a variety of vernacular houses were constructed. They were also built out of a variety of materials. It was during this period, however, that pre-fabricated housing became popular in the county; houses could now be bought from mail-order catalogues such as Sears Roebuck & Co. The Smith House is an example of such a house. It is two-stories in height and irregular in shape; walls are clad with novelty siding while the gable ends are decorated with half-timbering and stucco. The gable roof is covered with composition shingles and the entire structure rests on a cast concrete foundation.

This building was constructed at 607 W. Arch Street which is five blocks southwest of the court square in Searcy. The Smith House was constructed c. 1920 and is in excellent condition. Its main, or north elevation is dominated by a projecting gable at the second story. Double-pane casement windows are found on all three sides of this room. Large wooden brackets are found not only on this gable end but the others as well. A one-story porch extends from the projecting gable around to the east elevation of the structure. The shed roof of this porch is supported by brick columns that are connected with a solid brick balustrade. A single door accesses the porch on the north elevation. Fenestration on the building consists of four-over-one double-hung wood sash windows. One-story shed roof bays are located on both the northwest and southeast corners of the original house. Single or paired windows relieve these bays. A two-story rear "T" extends from the south elevation of the structure. This portion of the house is original although only the second story is now visible because of later additions. Casement windows similar to ones found on the main elevation's projecting gable are located on this rear "T" as well. These casement windows are found on all three sides of the rear "T". A one-story shed roof addition is located on the east elevation of the rear "T". Extending from the south elevation of the one-story shed roof addition around to the west elevation of the rear "T" is a one-story gable roof addition. A single asymmetrically placed door accesses the carport that is attached to the west elevation of this latest addition. The carport has a shed roof that is supported by metal posts.

The interior of the house retains many of the original features that were ordered from the Sears Roebuck catalogue. These features include a window bay seat, book cases and a staircase. This staircase has been moved to provide easier access for handicapped individuals but is otherwise intact.

Approximately ten yards south of the house is a garage. This structure has a gable roof and the walls are clad with novelty siding. Two sliding doors relieve the north elevation of the building. An asymmetrically placed door originally accessed the east elevation of the garage but this entrance has since been boarded over. Two small asymmetrically arranged fixed-frame windows fenestrate the south elevation of the structure. The garage was built c. 1930 and is in fair condition.

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Significance

The significance of this house lies in the fact that it is one of only two known mail-order houses found in the county. It is also one of the finest known examples of a Sears house in the state. The original portion of the Smith House is a virtual duplicate of Sears Modern Home #264P202. This model was first offered in the 1916 Sears Roebuck catalogue for a cost of about \$1,200.

For the above stated reasons the Smith House is significant for its contribution to the study of vernacular architecture and is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance.


