## National Register of Historic Places Continuation Sheet

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#### Description

Built in 1939 with funds from federal relief programs, the American Legion Community Hall #106 has a design, plan and construction method that is characteristic of other government-funded public buildings from the 1930's. The structure, which is now used as office space, is located on the courthouse square on Searcy's main thoroughfare. It is still in good condition and has undergone very little alteration since its construction fifty years ago.

The building is one story with an irregular floorplan, which includes an original projection on the rear (north) elevation. Its native stone construction, multi-paned windows and one-bay, central front porch with a flat, parapeted roof are all features that are distinctive to the Works Progress Administration, National Youth Administration and/or Civilian Conservation Corps structures built throughout the state during the Depression years.

The front (south) elevation of the building has a flat roof with a parapet, the rear (north) elevation is covered with a composition shingle gable roof, and the rear projection has a shed roof. Two native stone chimneys stand opposite each other on the east and west elevations. The original fenestration consists of nine-over-nine and six-over-six double-hung windows along all elevations. At the front entrance, a one-bay porch has a rounded-arch entry topped with a cast concrete nameplate, and a pair of multi-paned french doors allows access to the interior. The foundation is constructed of cast concrete.

Native stone is also used in the two fireplaces on either end of the main room in the building's interior. Their rounded-arch openings are topped with narrow cut stone shelves serving as mantels.

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#### Significance

Architecturally, the American Legion Building is significant because its design and construction method are reflective of the style consistently used by the period's government-funded programs - a style that influenced the appearance of other properties throughout the county's communities. As discussed in the associated property type for Depression Era Religious and Institutional Buildings, stylistic elements such as the rounded-arch entry porch with parapet roof, multi-paned windows and the use of native stone are characteristic of WPA, CCC, and NYA schools, community centers and other public buildings; yet this is the only surviving structure in White County that was built for the American Legion. Therefore, this building is locally significant under National Register Criterion C. Its period of significance is limited to one year due to its 1939 date of construction.

Historically, the building is also locally significant under Criterion A because of its associations with the county's federal relief programs and with the American Legion organization. The federal relief programs were a vital part of almost every community in the country throughout the Depression years, and Searcy's program was no exception. As discussed in Historic Context 3: Boom and Bust: The War and Depression Era, these programs put thousands of the unemployed to work while also making physical improvements to a community's landscape.

Searcy's American Legion, known as the Amsstrong-Caldwell Post No. 106, was organized in January, 1920, one year after the national organization was formed in Paris, France. Thirty World War I veterans met for several years at the courthouse until their growing membership necessitated the construction of this Legion hut on the north side of the courthouse square. Few people in Searcy knew what the Legion stood for when it was first formed, so a publicity committee was appointed to give talks at schools and public gatherings and to write articles for the local newspapers. Throughout the years, this chapter played an active role in community affairs; for example, it sponsored local prize fights, the county's first annual Strawberry Festival, and a "Free Feed" celebration in the midst of the Depression.
