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Description

Commercial buildings of the Development Era (1835-1870) mirrored current architectural trends. Builders during this period in White County did not construct many high-style buildings; they instead used architectural details from these styles to elaborate their basically vernacular buildings. The Robertson Drugstore is no exception to this.

Located on the southwest corner of Spring and Arch Streets, and on the courthouse square, the Robertson Drugstore is located in what was once the economic heart of Searcy. The building is two-stories tall, rectangular in shape with a chamfered corner, and constructed of brick. Even though it was built in c. 1860, it is still in good condition. The storefront windows along Arch St. have been replaced by single-pane fixed frame windows while the windows facing Spring St. have been boarded over. A metal awning which protects the storefront is the only other modern alteration.

Original elements on the ground-floor include cast iron columns framing the windows and supporting the second floor of the chamfered corner. A dentilated belt course separates the first and second floors. While none of the second floor windows are original, they are still framed by decorative brick hood molds with keystones. The flat with parapet roof has a dentilated cornice and a one-bay gabled portion which rises up from the center of the main elevation's roof line.

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Significance

When this building was constructed, c. 1860, it was one of several businesses which fronted the courthouse. It is the only one of these buildings which has survived the ravages of time. Not only was it the first drugstore in town, it is also the oldest, extant, commercial building in the county.

Robertson Drugstore was built by Stephen Brundidge, Sr., a Searcy bricklayer who migrated to the area from Alabama. With his portable brickmaking machine and oven he built several other buildings in the area. Each one of the bricks was made from river bank clay which was carted to the site and then shaped and baked. Brundidge's legacy was carried on not only through his high quality brick buildings but through his son as well. Stephen Jr. was an Arkansas State Representative for Congressional District 6 between 1897 and 1909.

The building is named after Dr. P.A. Robertson who was the original occupant of the structure and was a druggist from Memphis. His store offered not only the usual drugs and elixirs found in drugstores of the day but other items as well. Robertson had the only glass-cutter in town and he also sold household supplies such as oil, paints, and window panes.

Robertson was important to the community not only for the goods and services his store offered but also for his role in the development of the community. In 1871, he was selected to be the Public Grounds Committee Chairman. This group was responsible for regulating the use, upkeep, and growth of Spring Park which was a popular bathing area and mineral spring. The following year he was appointed secretary of the Searcy Branch Railroad which was responsible for the construction of a wooden, horse-drawn, rail-line which connected Searcy with the Cairo & Fulton Railroad.
